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FIVE NEW COUNTY ROADS APPROVED

Five new county roads were ordered established yesterday by the Marion county court. Due to the filing of several remonstrances protesting the establishment of the Hovenden road near Hubbard, the court deferred action on that project until November 5. Objectors to the route said it was too expensive and contended a shorter, less expensive road could be built.

The five new roads ordered established were:

A short road into the Aurora cemetery.

A road near St. Paul petitioned for by Frank Bernards and others.

A road near Talbot running to a gravel bar in the Willamette river petitioned for by Eva V. Wintermarten and others.

A short stub road in the Silver Falls country petitioned for by Hans Christensen and others.

Another short stub road near old St. Louis petitioned for by L. G. Ferschweiler and others.

A road south of Salem petitioned for by L. C. Smith and others was ordered viewed and surveyed. Another road asked for by Oral Egan and others in the Bridge Creek country was re-ordered viewed and surveyed. An order for a view and survey of this road was made last spring but due to the late snow in that section the survey could not get in to the road and so a new view is ordered for this fall.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6. — (AP) — Investigating agents of the state banking committee today dispatched to Chicago papers for service on H. C. Hopson, executive vice-president of the Associated Gas and Electric company, whose books the group wants to examine in its stock market inquiry.

Patrick J. Hurley, secretary of war in the Hoover cabinet and appearing as counsel for the company, informed the committee Hopson was in Chicago and now would accept service on a subpoena to appear.

Ferdinand Pecora, committee counsel, declared he had sought futilely for weeks to locate Hopson. Hurley appeared after E. B. Tracy, president of the United States and foreign and the United States and international investment securities corporations bared to the committee 10 a. s. s. running into the millions from railroad stock purchases.

The accident, said to have been due to fog, occurred on the highway across from the high school. Edward Law was driver of the truck. An inquest will be held here Saturday forenoon at 10 o'clock.

Willard was born in Plymouth, Neb., November 21, 1918, and came with his parents to Jefferson in 1928. He was a junior in the high school here.

Besides the parents, he leaves two brothers and three sisters: Donnie and Helen at home; Ar-

thur of Salinas, Calif.; Mrs. Carroll Erick of Flagler, Colo., and Mrs. L. G. Edwards of Corvallis. Funeral services will be held at the American Lutheran church in Salem, probably Monday afternoon, with Rev. F. W. Eriksen officiating. Interment will be at the City View cemetery in Salem.

W. U. ENROLLMENT REACHES 520 MARK

Willamette university's enrollment for the fall semester, 1933, is now 520, university officials said yesterday. That mark is almost exactly the same as was reached a year ago. Albany college and Linfield college report slight increases this year. Reed college has a smaller attendance than in 1932.

University officials have announced that they would continue a strict policy on collection of tuition at the rate of \$130 a year. To this a \$20 annual student body and athletic association fee is added. Some loan moneys are available to students who cannot pay cash but no long-time deferred payments will be acceptable to the university.

Come to Oregon Booklet Planned

The chamber of commerce is preparing copy for its new edition of the "Come to Oregon" booklet which is distributed to prospective residents. The edition will contain 48 pages and will be off the press next week, if present plans materialize.
