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BENEFIT FROM HOP INDUSTRY RECITED

Huge new Acreage set out Says Livesley; Oregon Revenue Enormous

Encouraged by the skyrocketing market the past season, hop men and would-be hop men have already increased hop plantings to near the saturation point. T. A. Livesley, one of the world's largest growers, told the Salem Retail Credit association luncheon gathering yesterday. An additional 5000 acres of hops are credited to plantings made and planned since the market boomed.

What the return of beer has already meant to Oregon from a financial standpoint was sketched by Livesley. With the 1933 crop estimated at between 90,000 and 95,000 bales and the average market figure 40 cents per pound, the harvest just completed will bring \$7,600,000 into Oregon, and of this, \$5,700,000 comes into Marion and Polk counties, where the bulk of Oregon hops are grown. Fully half this huge sum is expected for labor and supplies right in the producing section, he said.

Beer will bring back the 1300 or 1400 brewers that flourished before prohibition, Livesley believes, and these in turn will be able to consume about 225,000 bales of hops, the amount used before prohibition.

New plantings in California were responsible for the increase from 32,000 bales to 50,000 bales in the 1933 production for that state, Livesley said. Extreme heat allows first year plantings to produce heavily both in California and Washington, while Oregon new plantings do not bear well until the second season on account of weather conditions.

PASSION PLAY BURLESQUED
Production of the Passion Play is burlesqued to such an extent in parts of the Philippines that there is talk of banning the annual presentations. In one town the characters wear ugly masks and parade in the streets. Some appear in leaves and barks of trees, coarse sacks used in packing copra, or tattered clothes. One man wore an old priest's robe, another a rain coat, many have appeared almost naked. At one performance the "Christ" wore short trousers and was whipped with leaves and twisted rags. At another presentation a local rival whipped the man playing "Christ" with a bamboo pole, and a fist fight between "Christ" and the "Roman Soldier" was narrowly averted.

Two grand slams and six little slams were made on the above in the Statesman tournament. Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Kay bid and made seven no trumps. Dr. and Mrs. W. Baum bid and made seven diamonds. Mrs. P. D. Quisenberry playing with Mrs. Gus Hixson bid and made six hearts. Mrs. Callaghan playing with Mrs. Simons bid and made six hearts. Dr. J. E. Albrich playing with Dr. R. D. Blatchford bid and made six hearts. Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Hemmaway bid and made six hearts. Mrs. G. G. and Mrs. Wagstaff bid and made six no trumps. Katherine Laughridge playing with Maxine Claggett bid and made six hearts. Many teams bid a small slam but failed to make their contract. I consider the seven no trump which gave the Kays the top score on the above board was a splendid bid.

Two teams bid a grand slam in hearts. It is interesting to note that a grand slam in hearts cannot be made, even though the finesse works. With hands containing two solid, or nearly solid five-card or longer suits, the percentage is much greater in playing the hand successfully in no trump than at a suit.

Playing at a suit, if the trump does not break, there is nothing to do, while if the hand is played at a no trump, if one suit does not break, another suit can be resorted to. The contract of seven no trump was one of the most beautiful bids made at the tournament.

Ernest Tallman Escapes Serious Injury in Crash

Word has been received by Wells Tallman, local real estate dealer, that his son, Ernest W., escaped with slight injuries in a plane crash near Santa Barbara, Cal., while on his way as delegate to the Legion convention at Chicago. He started out in a plane belonging to a friend and they had only gone about 20 miles, traveling in a dense fog, when they dived into a high tension wire and crashed to the ground. It was considered a great miracle the plane did not catch fire and cremate its victims.

The occupants, four in number, were all dragged out unconscious. Mr. Tallman regaining consciousness just as the ambulance arrived, and all were taken to the hospital. The owner of the plane suffered fractures of both legs, while Mr. Tallman received a cut on his back, a leg bruise and an egg-sized lump on the back of his head, but despite the accident he caught the Legion special at Los Angeles and proceeded to his destination.

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MANAGER FORM IS BACKED IN SURVEY

The city manager form of government was favored by a majority of persons expressing opinions in a recent survey conducted by students in Professor W. C. Jones' statistics class at Willamette university. Out of 238 questioned, 77 were either undecided or uninformed.

Of those giving definite answers, 192 favored the manager form of city government while 50 were opposed to it. The survey was termed an "experiment in sampling" with an attempt made to contact various types of individuals. The report included the following statistics:

Random selection of names from telephone book: Yes 27, no 10, undecided 12, uninformed 7. People questioned at various street corners to contact mechanics, shoppers, canary workers, professional and business employees: Yes 34, no 15, undecided 5, uninformed 16. House to house canvass in various sections: Yes 26, no 14, undecided 3, uninformed 13. Questioning in restaurants and service stations: Yes 6, no 11, undecided 1, uninformed 3. Interviews in business houses, professional offices: Yes 9, no 9, undecided 3, uninformed 9.
