Numerous Radio Broadcasts To Mark Occasion; big Dinner Plan Here

Celebrating founder's day, birthday of Sir George Williams, founder of the Young Men's Christian association, radio networks in this county will tomorrow and Thursday carry messages from the great of two nations. Closing radio recognition of the Y's program will be given Friday when President Roosevelt speaks over the combined networks at 7 p. m., Pacific time.

Tomorrow's schedule by Pacific time includes: 1:15 p. m., F. W. Smith, president of the national Y. M. C. A. council; 3:45, Francis S. Harmon, secretary of the Y international committee who spoke here in Salem two years ago and a fortnight ago addressed a large group of Y workers in Portland, speaking over the Columbia network; Lar Astor, American born member of parliament, speaking from London over the National Blue network at 4:15 p. m.

Thursday Harmon will be heard over the National Blue at 12:45. Over the same network, Walter Lippman, internationally famous journalist and psychologist, will broadcast at 7:45 a. m. Isabel MacDonald, daughter of Ramsey MacDonald, will broadcast from London at 11:45 a. m.

### TYPING AVAILABLE TO MORE STUDENTS

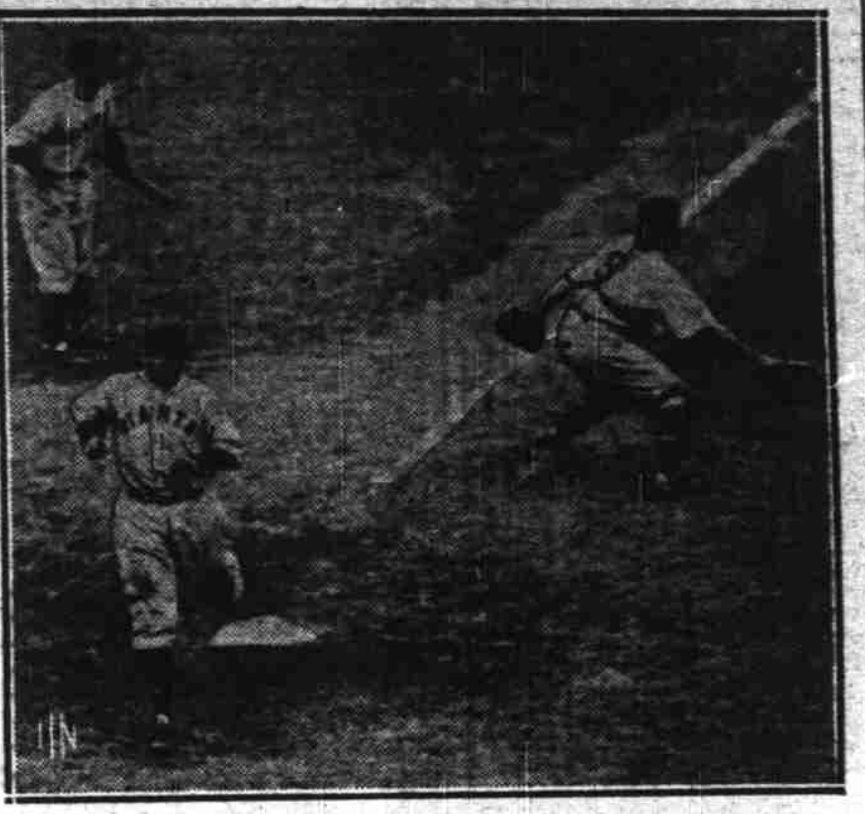
In spite of the fact that more than 25 persons have enrolled in the typing class conducted Tuesday and Thursday afternoons in the high school as a feature of the part time continuation school, there is still room for more pupils, Violet Swanson, director of the school, announced yesterday. A second classroom will be available should the class outgrow the present accommodations, Miss Swanson said.

The class, which meets at 3:30 o'clock two afternoons each week, is taught by Elizabeth Hogg of the high school commercial department faculty. On Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays the typewriters in the two classrooms may be used at the same hour for practice by members of the special class.

Boys and girls who have been forced by circumstances to drop out of full-time school and adults interested in obtaining certain phases of school missed previously are eligible for the classes conducted under the direction of the continuation school.

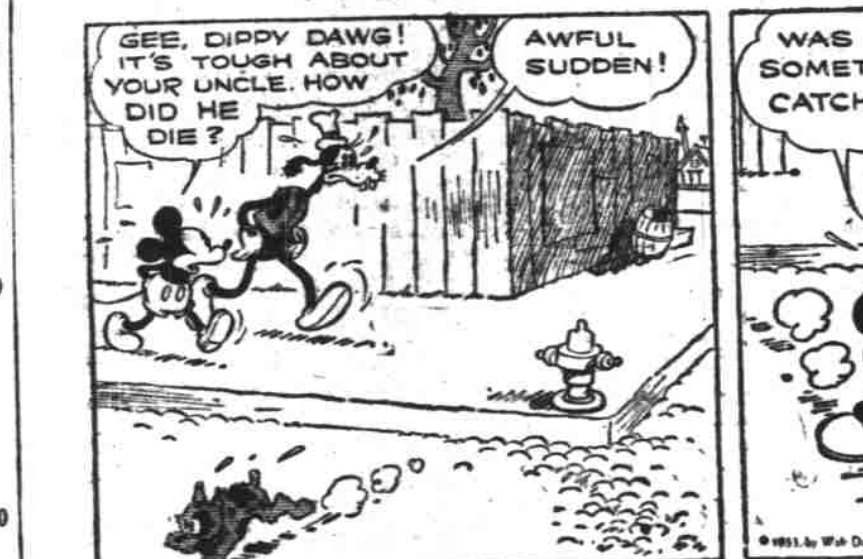

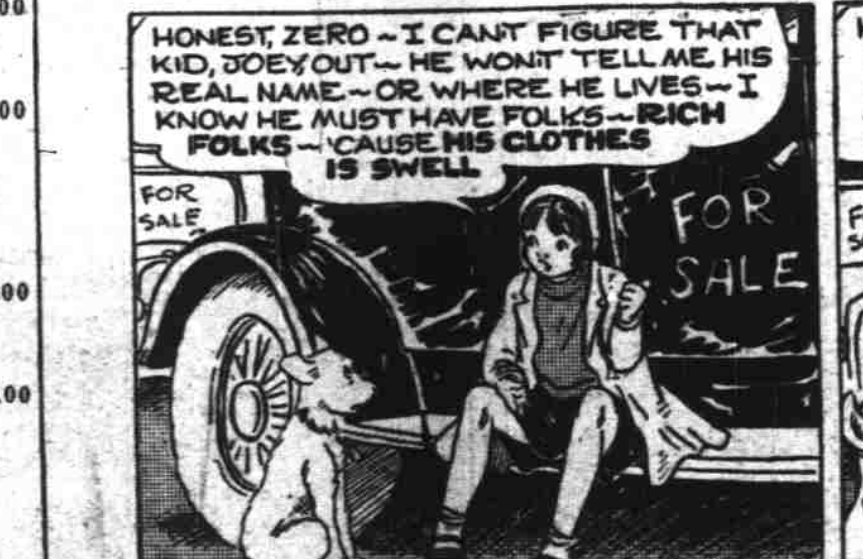
