WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The appeal of the Columbia Deschutes Power company, asserting riparian rights to water from the Deschutes river in Wasco and Sherman counties in Oregon was dismissed Tuesday by the United States supreme court.

Attorney General Van Winkle of Oregon asked such dismissal on the grounds the appeal was not taken within the time allowed.

LOANS AUTHORIZED UPON MANY HOMES

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 11.—(AP)—The advisory board of the Home Owners' Loan corporation Tuesday authorized loans totaling \$600,715.85 on small homes in Oregon, and examination of titles was authorized.

A total of 152 loans in Multnomah county, aggregating \$342,250.04, and 143 loans outside of Multnomah county, aggregating \$257,045.19 were approved.
