

FRANZ NIBLER DIES, GERVAIS

Funeral Rites Will be Held Saturday Morning for Man Nearly 100

GERVAIS, Oct. 12. — Franz Nibler, probably the oldest resident of Marion county, passed away this morning at the home here. Next January he would have observed his 100th birthday anniversary. Mr. Nibler was also one of the few remaining Civil war veterans.

He was born in Bavaria, province, Germany, January 6, 1834, and came to America when he was but 11 years old. He first lived in Wisconsin. He made two trips to the west coast in 1863 and 1867. On the last one he settled near St. Paul, and lived there and at St. Louis and Gervais since.

Lived Here 62 Years
For 62 years Mr. Nibler received his mail from the Gervais postoffice, and for the last 25 years he has resided in the same house in Gervais.

He enlisted in the 14th Minnesota volunteers March 17, 1862, and in addition to Civil war service engaged in the Indian war in Minnesota. He was the father of 11 children, nine of whom are living. Mrs. Nibler passed away in September, 1901.

Surviving children are Rose Strobel of Spokane, Margaret Coolidge of Laurel, Tillie Elliott of Tulsa, Calif., Marie Schmidt of Eugene, Nick Nibler of Portland, Sophia Borgelt and Francis Nibler of Laurel.

He was a member of Poorman camp, Woodburn, of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Dallas Firemen Assume New Roles; Godfathers For Amateur Carpenters

DALLAS, Oct. 12. — Members of the Dallas fire department are assisting in the work of sponsoring the manual training department in the local high school this year and through their efforts, the department has installed a drill press for both wood and metal. The firemen also plan to make other additions to the manual training equipment when their funds permit.

Several years ago, at Christmas time the local firemen took over the task of distributing toys and Christmas candies to the children of Dallas, and the manual training class at the high school assisted in this work by making toys for distribution. Through this method, toys were given to children who might otherwise have been forgotten.

Through this work the fire department became interested in the manual training class and last year the firemen sponsored a show to obtain money to buy equipment for the school shop. As a result of the show the school secured the necessary money to purchase the drill press which is now used for drilling both wood and metal; shaping the edges of table tops; making mortice, tenon and dovetail joints, and for routing and carving. The press added greatly to the efficiency of the shop and bettered the quality of the work turned out by the boys. It also increased the popularity of the course, due to the many types of work it could be used for, so that the classes are now filled to capacity.

Other additions to the equipment of the shop are expected to be made whenever the firemen charge, assisted by Father Riley of Mt. Angel, a grand-nephew of the aged man. Six grandsons will be pallbearers. Burial will be in the Catholic cemetery here.

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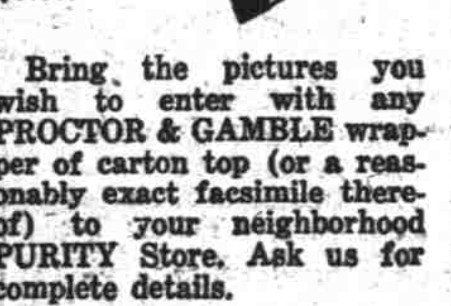
