

SILVERTON MILL IS
WINNER IN COURTS

The case of Edward L. Eyre Grain company versus the Cereal Products company of Portland, was decided by a jury in Judge Crawford's court in favor of the grain company and Fischer Flouring mill of Silverton. The controversy was the outgrowth of the closing of the mill last summer and the payment of a \$2000 check made in favor of the Fischer Flouring mill by the Cereal Products company, and endorsed by Paul Benson, bookkeeper for the flouring mill, over to Eyre and company.

The Cereal Products company was formed about three months before the flouring mill closed; the officers of the company being L. A. Tate, president; Paul T. Benson, vice-president, and J. B. V. Kirkup, secretary and treasurer. The contention of the cereal company was that P. T. Benson did not have the right to endorse the check over to the Eyre Grain company, but the jury held there was an implied authority, on account of the long standing transactions between the flouring mill and the Eyre company, and decided in their favor.

Vegetable Soup, Serving Four
1 cup navy beans
1/2 cup peas
1/2 cup diced celery
1/2 cup chopped onions
8 cups water
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
Mix ingredients and cook slowly in covered pan 2 hours. Serve in soup bowls or cups.
Fruit Cookies (8 Lozen)
(Excellent for Lunch Boxes)
1 cup fat
2 cups brown sugar
2 eggs
4 tablespoons cream
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1 cup raisins
4 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
Cream fat and sugar. Add rest of ingredients. Drop dough from tip of spoon onto greased baking sheets. Flatten well and bake 12 minutes in moderate oven.
Banana Cake Dessert
1/2 cup fat

1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup sour milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
1 cup mashed bananas
1/2 cup dates, chopped
1/2 cup nuts, chopped
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
Cream fat and sugar. Add rest of ingredients and blend well. Pour into shallow pan which has been lined with waxed paper. Bake 25 minutes in moderately slow oven. Cool. Cut in squares and serve topped with whipped cream.
