Crawford, Portland; Rev. B. Earle Parker and Rev. Thomas D. Yarnes, Salem. The committee has already met but has made no public statement regarding the men it was considering.

Both Candidates Have Methodist Background
Both Dr. Spencer and Dr. Baxter have a Methodist background. The former received his A.B. degree at Kentucky Wesleyan college in 1903 and his A.M. degree two years later at Northwestern university, also a Methodist school.

Dr. Spencer's teaching experience includes five different institutions of higher education from 1901 to 1911. In 1919 he was a lecturer in journalism at University of Wisconsin summer school. The same year he joined the faculty of University of Washington as professor of journalism. A short time later he became dean of journalism there. Following the removal of Dr. Henry Spuzalo he became president of Washington, September 21, 1927, a position he held until March 26, 1933, when he accepted his resignation which had been submitted January 27, 1933. The board at that time declared it "wanted it distinctly understood that the acceptance of his resignation is not to be construed as a reflection upon Dr. Spencer's ability or loyalty."

Dr. Baxter was born at Rock Run, Ohio, in 1892, the son of John Matthew and Nina K. Baxter. He received his A.B. at Oberlin college in 1915, and his M.A. at the Oberlin graduate school of theology in 1916.
Baxter's Prominence In Church Program
In 1917 he was awarded the degree of Bachelor of Sacred Theology at the Boston University School of Theology. His D. D. was received at College of Pacific in 1925. In 1924 Dr. Baxter married Martha Estroff.

Dr. Baxter was ordained in the Methodist Episcopal ministry in 1918, and in the same year became field secretary of the M. E. Centenary movement and the Interchurch World Movement. From 1920 to 1924 he was professor of the English Bible at Mount Union college. In 1924 he went to Southern California where he became professor of homiletics and chaplain. In 1930 he was made assistant to the president of U.S.C. and the next year became dean of the school of religion.
During the summer of 1925 he preached at Highbury Quadrant Congregational church in London.
Dr. Baxter is a member of the Southern California conference of the Methodist Episcopal church. He is a director of the Los Angeles Y.M.C.A. and of the City Missionary Society there.
Dr. Baxter contributes frequently to church periodicals.

Europe to Push Stratosphere Exploration



Encouraged by the wave of enthusiasm that swept the nation following the success of the first Soviet flight into the stratosphere, Russian aviation authorities are planning a series of such flights which will begin next Spring and be carried out at the rate of one a week. To this end a nation-wide subscription has been started for funds to build the necessary craft. Under the direction of P. F. Fedosenko, who conceived the first flight, it is proposed to build a stratosphere balloon of much greater proportions than the U. S. S. R., which, piloted by George Prokofiev and E. E. Birnbaum, attained an altitude of 8.3 miles recently, to shatter all existing records. The object of the stratosphere program was announced as a drive to "conquer the stratosphere for Stalin."

ALCATRAZ PICKED, GANGSTER PRISON

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12—(AP)—A prison island with bluff, rocky shores, unfriendly alike to escape attempts and convicting friends, has been selected by the justice department for the future home of desperate gangsters, kidnapers and other persistently troublesome federal convicts.
Attorney General Cummings, in outlining the plan to newspapermen, said the prison island would be used to detain underworld characters who foster rebellion among prisoners, attempt to bribe guards and have influential organized gangster friends at large who are constantly attempting to aid in their escape.
Alcatraz island was selected for the purpose, its rocky shores rise precipitately from San Francisco bay. It is more than a mile from the nearest mainland point. A swift forbidding current swirls constantly around it. In all its long history as a military prison not one inmate has escaped.
The attorney general indicated definitely that Harvey Bailey and George Kelly, sentenced to life terms for the Urshel kidnaping, would be sent to the island. Asked about Al Capone he was non-committal.

DAVIS FREED UPON LOTTERY CHARGES

NEW YORK, Oct. 13—(AP)—Long-standing lottery charges against U. S. Senator James J. Davis of Pennsylvania, described by government prosecutors as a "Mussolini of the Moose" and by his own counsel as a "great humanitarian," were wiped out by the jury's verdict tonight.
Davis, director general of the Loyal Order of Moose, and Theodore G. Miller, head of the Moose propagation department, were acquitted in federal court after a trial lasting three weeks, three and a half days.
It was the second trial for Davis, the first having ended in a mistrial a year ago.
The senator greeted the verdict with a toss of his graying, lion-like head. Tears welled into his eyes. A cheer shook the courtroom and spectators pressed forward to congratulate the acquitted man. Scowling, Davis said: "I never lost my faith because I knew I was innocent."

Capture of Trio Thursday Leaves Only Three of Insane Uncaught

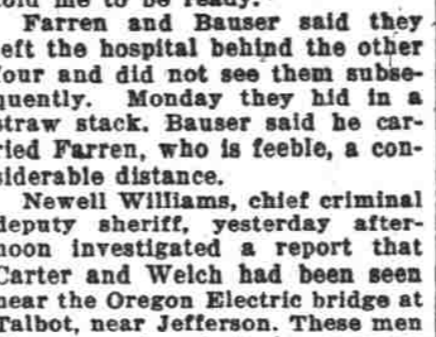
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down on the river road and he went to Portland to get replacement parts.

Theft of Rowboat Leads to Capture

The first report that Bauser and Farren had been seen in the Fairview district was received at state police headquarters Tuesday night from Ernest Todd who said his boat had been stolen at Wheatland ferry by two men. Theft of the Todd boat was witnessed by L. R. Cooper and his son, Harland, who were picking filberts nearby.
Taking out a motorboat yesterday morning in search for his rowboat, Todd sighted a rowboat containing one or two men, he said. He continued downstream a short distance where he went to a farm telephone and called state police.
Two state officers joined Todd and searched the river by boat and afoot until they found the rowboat tied to the limb of a tree on shore. Following footprints, they discovered nearby the well provisioned camp, for many years used as a summer camp. Bauser and Farren were found seated near a bonfire.
Police are Certain Fugitives Took Boat
State police placed little credence in the denial of Bauser and Farren that they had stolen the boat. Cars, still wet, report found leaning against a tree at the camp.
Both Bauser and Farren told a story almost identical with that related by Becker following his arrest Monday. They said Bowen had planned the break.
"Bowen was here several days before the break if I would like to go home," Farren said, "and when I replied that I would he told me to be ready."
Farren and Bauser said they left the hospital behind the other four and did not see them subsequently. Monday they hid in a straw stack. Bauser said he carried Farren, who is feeble, a considerable distance.

of public works money. Aside from Portland, the other cities in the group are Salem, Oregon City, Gladstone and Beaverton.
"We believe the method outlined in our report is the most practical one for Salem and cities similarly situated," said Cunningham, who visited Salem yesterday.
"After the cities take care of general sewage there remains the problem of industrial waste which is a more serious problem in stream pollution than sewage. The pulp mills are cooperating in an effort to solve this problem and preliminary studies are now under way. Fruit canneries also present a serious problem which must be solved."
Cunningham is a member of the firm of Baer and Cunningham which has handled the engineering work for Salem on a water system.

Party Lines in N. Y. Erased by Bolt to McKee

NEW YORK, Oct. 12—(AP)—The democratic revolt to Joseph V. McKee in Brooklyn and Queens tried in circuit court here today as the city's mayoralty candidates completed framing the campaign issues.
The women's democratic forum of Brooklyn, John H. McCooey's women's organization, was reported to be awaiting only the action of the Brooklyn democratic executive committee on Monday—a meeting the veteran leader was forced to call by his workers—before openly declaring for McKee.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 12—(AP)—Lester Hixon, being tried in circuit court here on a charge of horse stealing, dismissed his legal counsel and undertook his own defense yesterday. He placed himself and other witnesses on the stand, cross examined state witnesses, argued points of procedure with the court, and addressed a statement to the jury. His efforts were rewarded with a "hung" jury.

COAL MINE REGION DISORDER SPREADS

SULLIVAN, Ind., Oct. 12—(AP)—A national guard company from Attica, Ind., set up camp on the Sullivan county courthouse lawn tonight to enforce a military order amounting to almost complete martial law in this coal mining region, rocked this morning by three mysterious explosions.
Shortly before the troops arrived, members of three of the largest United Mine Workers of America locals in the county, on strike since guardsmen entered the district Monday, voted to return to work tomorrow.
New disorders broke out tonight at Paxton, a mining village five miles south of Sullivan. Major Earl Welmar of the national guard went to Paxton to investigate an explosion, apparently of mine blasting powder, in a vacant lot adjoining the home of Frank Dunbar, employed at the Starburn mine. There was no property damage.
Following the blast Major Welmar announced sentries would be posted on all roads leading into Sullivan county after 10 p. m. to stop and inspect all automobiles.
