Time Yet to Give Trees Anthracnose Spray, Says Barss

Though it is a bit late to do the best job of protecting apple rees against anthracnose, there is still time to save orchards from serious ravages of the disease this winter, says H. P. Barss, plant pathologist of the Oregon Experiment station. The amount of anthracnose canker in orchards was greatly increased this year through neglect of spraying in 1932, he finds.

Some new infection has unloubtedly taken place already this fall during the September rains. Bordeaux mixture 6-6-50 or even 4-4-50 applied the latter part of October to every twig and branch will, however, prevent most of the destrcution which otherwise will occur. If the fruit is not yet harvested, the spray will help to protect it against later storage de-


