offers the best choice of a lead that may defeat the contract. An amusing hand played by the American bridge team which invaded England several years ago furnishes an illustration of the havoc sometimes wrought by a fogical opening lead:

Colonel Buller, who challenged the American team on the theory that four brilliant players needed no system of bidding, bid two notrump on the west hand, and everyone passed. Theodore Lightner, in north position, felt that a lead from his four-card diamond tenace would be unwise, and since he held a sequence in clubs, preferred to lead that suit rather than from a single honor. His partner held seven clubs headed by the ace-king. After the seven lub tricks were taken, diamonds were led and Buller had, unfor-
