

REPORTS ON ESTATES NUMEROUS THURSDAY

Many Handled by Ladd & Bush; Miles and Gregoire Among Long List

Reports on a number of estates were filed Thursday in probate court here, principally by the Ladd & Bush Trust company which is handling them.

The estate of B. J. Miles, deceased, has assets of \$16,710 and income in the reported period was \$224 and outgo \$500. The estate of the late May P. Gregoire has assets of several thousand dollars with income of \$754 and outgo of \$29 in the reported period. Jennie Langraf, deceased, left an estate of \$9484, according to the report, with income to the estate in the reported period of \$320 and outgo of \$160. The estate of the late Ada Lake amounts to \$3278 with income of \$50 and outgo of \$100 in the last year.

The estate of the late Jacob Fiedler, 72, who died October 5, was admitted to probate and the First National bank of Portland, Salem branch, was named executor of his will. He left personal property valued at \$10,000. There are four heirs.

Elizabeth Birken, deceased, who died June 8, 1933, left an estate of real property valued at \$500 according to a report filed by the executor.

Ulysses P. Simpson was named by the court as executor of the will of the late Ada B. Simpson who left an estate which has an estimated value of \$4000.

LOCAL MAN NAMED FOR FOREST STUDIES

Lynn F. Cronmiller, Oregon state forester, is one of only four state foresters who have been selected along with other delegates to the Forest Conservation conference to be held under the lumber and timber code of the national recovery act. The conference convenes in Washington October 24 and lasts through October 26.

Two other delegates from Oregon are Portland men, B. W. Kain and D. T. Mason, both of the Pine association. The conference calls, among other things, for a survey for timber conservation and is unique in that initiative is being taken by the forest industries.

Other state foresters who have been chosen delegates are from Michigan, New York and Texas.

ASHBY HOUSE NEAR RICKEY BURNS DOWN

RICKEY, Oct. 19.—Fire which caught about mid-afternoon today on the roof of the J. B. Ashby place, occupied by the M. W. Miller family, completely destroyed the house, windmill and woodshed. Only a small amount of bedding and a few pieces of furniture were saved.

While the origin is not definitely known, it is presumed the high wind fanned a spark which had fallen on the kitchen roof.

The residence was partly insured but there was no insurance on the contents. The Millers are stopping with friends. Whether Ashby will rebuild is not yet known.

Independent Gas Dealers Electing At Night Session

The Marion county unit of the Independent Retail Dealers in Gasoline will meet tonight at 8 o'clock at the Labor temple. Election of officers and discussion of moves to bring about a lower gas price to the consumer will be features of the meeting. About 100 dealers are expected to attend.

S. L. Thompson, formerly of North Carolina but now of Eugene, will attend the meeting. Thompson claims that the public should not have to pay more than 17 cents for first grade gasoline. Findings in Louisiana, he declares, show that profits of \$20 per barrel of crude oil are made on by-products alone.

W. U. Committee Considers Men

While members of the trustees' committee considering new presidents for Willamette university have made no recommendations, confirmation that they had considered both Dr. Bruce Baxter of Los Angeles and Dr. M. Lyle Spencer, former president of the University of Washington, was received in Salem yesterday. Advice from Seattle where Dr. Spencer resides was that he is definitely interested in the presidency of a smaller institution than the one he headed for six years and continues in Salem to look at Willamette university. Dr. Baxter is scheduled to arrive in Salem this month and to make a number of public appearances.

Willamette university chapter of Blue Key, national honorary service organization, has announced the election of seven new members, bringing the roster to 23. The men elected are Miles Woodworth, Garfield Barnett, and George Cannady, of Portland; Loren Graun, of Peoria; Billy Goldstein, of Wash.; Rex Young, Rainier, Ore.; Edward Frantz, Nelsville, Wis.; and Joe Herberger, Canby, Ore.

Nazi Coercion to be Probed



Charges that many Germans in the United States are being compelled to cooperate with Nazi organizers through threats of reprisals against their relatives in Germany will be probed at the forthcoming Congressional investigation sponsored by Representative Samuel Dickstein, of New York, chairman of the Congressional Committee on Immigration. Among those expected to testify is Heinz Spanknebel, head of the Freunde des Neuen Deutschlands (Friends of New Germany), Chancellor Hitler's head man in the United States. Dr. Hans Luther, German Ambassador to Washington, was also invited to testify, but it is believed his diplomatic status makes his acceptance impossible. Findings of the committee may be basis of representations to the German government by Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

TENTATIVE BUY NOW PLANS ARE OUTLINED

Headed by Ralph Cooley, a committee of Salem business men yesterday outlined a tentative program for a Buy Now campaign in this city. The committee will convene again Monday noon at the Marion hotel to give further consideration to the plans.

Every business firm in the city will be asked to participate in the drive. A variety of means will be used to attract public attention to the advisability of purchasing when goods are at the present low levels. Newspaper advertising, announcements to various clubs and societies, probably a city-wide essay contest, decoration of store windows and the widespread use of Buy Now placards and posters are contemplated.

Figures showing the upswing in payrolls brought by improved business and also statistics showing the soundness of purchasing at present low prices will be widely used.

Tentative plans call for starting the local move November 1 and ending it November 30. The entire project will be closely tied to the national Buy Now move, officially endorsed and promoted by the NRA organization leaders.

GOSS' WHEREABOUTS UNKNOWN, REPORTED

Mystery surrounds the whereabouts of O. H. Goss, leader of the unemployed group that camped on the courthouse lawn a week or more early in the summer, and when the camp was dispersed by the police was arrested for vagrancy.

Goss was tried for the first time July 11 and the jury disagreed. At the second trial July 20 he was found guilty and Justice of the Peace Hayden sentenced him to serve six months in the county jail. Goss personally gave notice of appeal and his bond of \$100 was furnished by W. J. Peters and G. M. Wyatt.

Transcript of appeal was filed in circuit court but the case has never been docketed for hearing. Friends of Goss say that he will appear whenever the date of his new trial is set, but his whereabouts and present occupation are unknown.

HEARING MONDAY ON SALMON RIVER CASE

Arguments of attorneys in the suit brought by the Salmon river highway improvement district against the state highway commission, involving payment of \$120,000 of bonds incurred by the improvement district in the construction of the Salmon river cutoff road, will be heard by the state supreme court next Monday. The legislature several years ago enacted a special law providing that the highway commission should pay these bonds and relieve the highway improvement district of the burden. The act was repealed at the 1933 legislative session.

STATE MEN ARREST 36 DRUNK DRIVERS

Out of 453 arrests by operatives of the traffic division of the state police department during the month of September, 36 involved intoxicated automobile drivers, a report issued yesterday by Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police, reveals. Fines in these cases aggregated \$2815.

Fifty-seven persons were arrested for reckless driving, 55 for having no permit and 31 for having void foreign license plates. There were 260 arrests in the general law enforcement division of the state police department. Twenty of these arrests were for burglary, 18 for assault and battery, 78 for drunkenness, five for forgery and one for murder. Fines aggregated \$1742. Twenty persons arrested by the state police were held for other law enforcement agencies.

Arrests in the game division number 129 with fines of \$3845.90. There were six acquittals and 21 cases are now pending in the courts.

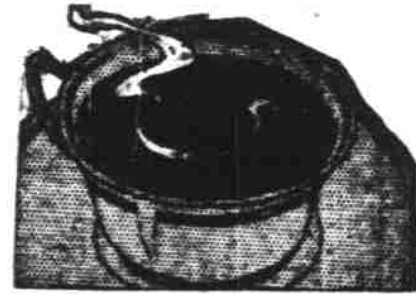
