Oregon Congress P. T. A. To Convene Tuesday For State Meet

SALEM will be host to 400 delegates from all parts of the state for a three-day conference of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers starting Tuesday, October 24. Sessions will be held in the First Presbyterian church.

Mrs. William T. Brice, state president, will preside at most of the business meetings. An unusual feature of the conference will be the children's "Pageant of the Nations" under the direction of Miss Gretchen Kreamer. Miss Carlotta Crowley, Miss Dorothy Taylor and Mrs. Dorothy Daugherty are assisting Miss Kreamer. All the participants will be dressed in costumes of the countries they represent and will sing native folk songs. The pageant is an event of Tuesday night at 7:45 o'clock. Seventy-two pupils from Lincoln, McKinley and Leslie schools will take part.
