

HUGE HIGHWAY PLAN TO GO BEFORE PWA

The allocation of federal funds includes \$2,400,000 on the Wilson river and \$2,000,000 on the Wolf Creek routes of the two highways from Portland to the sea. The west side Pacific highway, both the north and the south Santiam from Salem to Eugene on the highways, and improvements east side Pacific highway were included in the report. Other major western projects included the Skikyou route, the Willamette highway and improvement from Eugene south on the Pacific highway.

Meier Authorized to Give Program to State PWA Board

The detailed program, upon presentation to the governor, following a final check by the commission, will be proffered by the executive to the Oregon public works board. Upon hearing the program today, Governor Meier stated that "we can't go further than our estimated revenue in the next few years, but we must go as far as possible to assure the state a fair share of the federal funds for unemployment."

Scott declared the original \$12,500,000 would take the state 12 years to pay back out of the gasoline tax revenue of five cents a gallon being paid to the state. With the increased program, revenue over the present income of about five per cent, leaving no relief in sight from gasoline taxes for that period of time. If the loan is granted, it was declared the program could be handled by the state within 15 years.

Road Projects on the detailed program for western Oregon included: On the west side Pacific highway, Portland to Multnomah county line, \$235,000; Middleton-Lewberg, \$350,000; Newberg-McMinnville, \$100,000; McMinnville south, \$450,000; Pacific highway, Salem-Jefferson \$350,000; Jefferson-Albany \$250,000; South Santiam highway \$350,000; North Santiam highway \$350,000. On the Willamette highway, \$450,000 for the Salt Creek to the county line section.

Large Outlay Planned For Southern Oregon

On the south Pacific highway the detailed program calls for the following: Ashland-Neil Creek, \$100,000; Barron Creek-Wall Creek, \$225,000; Wall Creek to summit, including underpass, \$325,000; summit to the tunnel, \$250,000; Ashland to summit, \$250,000; Junction City to Eugene \$450,000 and from Rice Hill to Oakland, \$200,000.

Two determined delegations were included in the groups appearing before the highway officials for road funds today. They were the Linn and adjoining counties requesting completion of the Southern Santiam highway and the eastern group asking for the Mitchell-Antelope road of 34 miles connecting the John Day with the Wapinitia highway.

In the bidding for highway projects today there was a range of from \$650,000 to nearly \$1,000,000 on the 14 projects. One job was held for investigation and another rejected because bids were too high.

Theodore Arenz was awarded the job of pavement widening and resurfacing of the North Salem section of the Pacific highway in Marion county at a cost of \$37,300.

The three men in Acheson's office at 9:40, received the latest foreign exchange quotations and the London gold rate. After a quarter hour's deliberation, Jones read the following statement:

Trading in Wool Is at Standstill

BOSTON, Oct. 25. (AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Trading here in wool is practically at a standstill and there is almost a total absence of demand for stable quantities of wool. Lack of trading does not appear to be having any depressing effect upon quoted prices. The heavy buying in September served to cover, to a large extent, the current mill requirements. In view of the situation among manufacturers, members of the Boston wool trade are not making attempts to stimulate sales.

Powell Named for Bank Liquidation

Liquidation of the remaining assets of the old First National bank, estimated at \$125,000, was taken over by Keith Powell, receiver, yesterday when he relinquished his conservatorship of the institution. During the time of conservatorship negotiations were completed for the sale of the bank to the First National of Portland. The receivership under the sale agreement will probably continue for one year.

anon, Amity, Dundee, McMinnville and Vancouver, were jubilant over news of the advance, as this means that banks have given the first whole-hearted recognition to the nut industry.

Interest Costs To Be Relayed to Growers

The arrangement with the U. S. National bank makes it possible for the association to advance five cents per pound on graded deliveries of both walnuts and filberts to any member desiring this immediate advance. The North Pacific will pay six per cent interest for the money and will direct funds to each unit as required after November 1, taking notes for the advance. The unit in turn will take the note of the grower and charge him six per cent interest so that the central organization will entail no expense.

This plan has been arranged because many growers will not need the five cents advance, and the association does not wish to penalize these members for the charges incurred for those who do need assistance. Mr. Bentley points out in his letter to Mr. Adams:

Growers' notes will be liquidated early in December at the time of the first co-op distribution on walnuts and filberts.

Mr. Bentley points out that this will also give the independent grower an opportunity to get immediate funds and allow him to get advantage of the pool price instead of selling on the open market at once.

Huge Loan on Corn Available, Midwest

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (AP)—A corn loan policy expected by officials to make from \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000 quickly available in the heart of the corn belt was announced late today by Secretary Wallace after obtaining its approval in a conference with President Roosevelt. The plan was aimed to put a bottom under the present cash corn market.

Funds to be made through the newly created Commodity Credit corporation, organized by the farm administration, and the Reconstruction corporation. Funds of the latter will be used.

Lindbergh Suspect Bail Upped \$40,000

BOSTON, Oct. 25 (AP)—Bail for John Gorch, held here on fugitive warrants for New York and New Jersey police and who was questioned at length regarding the Lindbergh kidnapping, was increased today from \$10,000 to \$50,000 when he was arraigned in municipal court. New York authorities examined the contents of a safety vault in a New York bank for which Gorch had a receipt, but found nothing of value.

Kern Case Against Lutz Now on Trial

Trial of the case of P. D. Kern against W. H. Lutz yesterday afternoon continued Wednesday before Judge L. H. McMahon here. The jury hearing the case viewed the scene of the auto accident about which the case hinges. Kern claims Lutz was at fault and caused him damages of \$395. Defendant answered plaintiff's complaint with a counter-claim for \$1315. The accident occurred May 28, 1931, eight miles north of Salem on the Pacific highway.

MACON ON LONG HOP

SUNNYVALE, Calif., Oct. 25. (AP)—The U. S. S. Macon, giant navy dirigible, will leave here tomorrow for a cruise of approximately 55 hours which will take her south to San Diego and back north to the Oregon-California line before returning Saturday.

SEPTIMBER SHOWS GAIN

NEW YORK, Oct. 25. (AP)—The National Industrial Conference board announced today a survey of employment conditions in manufacturing centers throughout the country revealed a substantial increase in the hourly earnings and numbers of persons employed in September. Average hourly earnings of all wage earners combined in the 25 various industries reporting to the board increased from 49.7 cents in August to 53.1 cents in September.

Negro Gets Cash; Wrongly in Prison

CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 25. (AP)—Compensation of \$12,000 for the 12 months he spent in the Ohio penitentiary "death row" and the five times he faced electrocution before he was freed on a murder charge was voted Joseph Weaver, negro, today by the Cuyahoga county commissioners. The award was made possible through legislation passed by the last general assembly which authorized the commissioners to make compensation up to \$15,000.

Funds to pay the award are not available now, however. Weaver was convicted of killing a night watchman in April, 1927.

R.F.C. Wants Its Bank Loan Repaid

The Portland agency of the federal reconstruction finance corporation, through W. D. Schultz, manager, yesterday filed claims for preference in liquidation of the Bank of Woodburn. One claim is in the amount of \$41,723.53 and interest and the other for \$470. The major amounts involved in the claims were said to be due for money advanced by the corporation. The claims were filed in circuit court here. The Woodburn bank borrowed the money in 1932. A substantial amount of its advances had been repaid.

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
