ship; and \$25, life membership. Fifty cents of each dollar will go to national headquarters. However, citizens who wish to make donations to the Red Cross but who do not wish any part of the sum they give to go to the national offices may give any donation, instead of subscribing as members.

Captains for the various districts in Salem and throughout the county will be named later. Avery Thompson of Salem has been asked to handle publicity for the drive.

The past year the national Red Cross expended \$1,525,000 for disaster and other relief, aiding more than 25 million people. Red Cross chapters in 2500 communities engaged in unemployment relief.

The outstanding code feature, perhaps, is a provision requiring lumber and building material dealers to publish a printed price list of every article handled. He will not be permitted to undersell his price list either openly or by secret rebates. The prices must be approved by the code authority. Mr. Schoettler vouchsafed the opinion that a average lumber prices would not be increased markedly, at present.

"This office will be glad to hear complaints of overcharges or misrepresentations," Schoettler declared. "It is believed that with the code in effect, the dealer will have more time to give service to his patrons and the purchasers will in the end be protected."

The departure of Crawford severed the last Massachusetts link in the case which became nationally known. The two women were killed more than a year ago. Crawford was arrested here on January 13 for a store burglary and later was identified as the man wanted in Virginia. Governor Joseph E. Ely granted Crawford a writ of habeas corpus, basing his decision on the ground that Crawford's constitutional rights had been violated by the failure of Virginia to place negroes on grand juries.

The U. S. circuit court of appeals overruled this decision and the supreme court recently refused to review the case. Judge Lowell, obeying the mandate of the circuit court, then vacated the writ.

The action of Judge Lowell in granting the writ brought a storm of protest from the south and he was impeached in the house of representatives. A congressional committee was named to investigate the action and recently conferred with the jurist here.

NRA LUMBER CODE TO BE BENEFICIAL

Protect Purchaser, Avoid Cutthroat Practices, Declared Purpose

A revision of practices in the retail lumber and building material business that will result in greater protection to the purchaser and in virtual elimination of cut throat methods which have been rife here is now being put into effect under the NRA retail lumber code for which Lumber Promotion of Oregon, Inc., is code authority, L. R. Schoettler, district manager, announced yesterday. At least nine lumber dealers in Salem and about 80 in the district, which includes Marion, Polk, Linn and Lincoln counties and parts of Yamhill, Jefferson and Benton counties, will be affected, he said.

Primarily, enforcement of the code will insure to the lumber and building material retail buyer that he will receive his purchases in the grade, quality and quantity represented by the dealer. The dealer in turn, will no longer be subjected to the ruinous shopping for estimates which in the past has taken the fair profit out of the business, Schoettler stated. In one typical case here, it was reported that a lumber dealer reduced his estimate four times for a prospective purchaser who pretended to have but had not obtained quotations from other operators.

The county board of education and its advisory committee has nothing whatsoever to do with last year's school tuition costs, debts or any other fiscal operations, Mary Fulkerson, county school superintendent emphasized yesterday.

The remark was occasioned by statements made to M. W. Wainwright, chairman of the board and E. S. Porter, chairman of the advisory committee concerning last year's debts. They stated that savings effected this year by the board would have been greater had the county courts' levy for the last school year been sufficient to meet all obligations. Any deficit which may be on the books from last year will be taken care of by the county court, Mrs. Fulkerson asserted, reiterating that the county board of education, created only this year, had no jurisdiction in previous financial matters.

RELIEF NEEDS EYED BY BUDGET MAKERS

Completion of the federal public works program for Oregon and the employment of Marion county men who otherwise will be on the relief rolls is the rising star toward which members of the county court are gazing this week as they struggle over figures in the preliminaries of putting together the annual budget. That the \$40,000 indigent fund allowed in recent budgets may of necessity be enlarged to \$50,000 if further relief money does not become available seemed assured yesterday.

Added to this the \$100,000, estimated necessary for the old age pension voted this year, is causing court members no little perturbation. Then, too, most of the minute expenses contained in budget requests from various county offices are showing the effects of rising prices.

The old age pension fund voted as a state measure but dependent for its execution upon the counties will not be maintained in some Oregon counties. Klamath

county with the same proportionate allotment for its aged as Marion has reported that it will not be able to add the extra burden of taxation.

THREE OF SOLONS RESIGN FOR CAUSE

The formal resignation of Edward Allen, state senator from Washington county, was received at the executive department Friday. He recently was appointed acting postmaster at Forest Grove, which made him ineligible for a seat in the legislature.

Governor Meier also has received the resignations of Senator Linn Jones of Clackamas county and Representative Earl E. Day of Jackson county. Jones recently accepted the office of secretary of the state board of pharmacy, while Day was appointed judge of Jackson county.

Representative Edward Kelly of Jackson county who recently left for Washington to accept a federal position has not yet filed his resignation.
