

COAST BRIDGE PLAN IN PERIL

Note Financing Method is Questioned by PWA in Letter to Hockley

in its portfolio, subject to cancellation, if when and as congress should direct.

The letter to Mr. Hockley was fully answered over the weekend and the reply rushed air mail to Washington. In the answer the commission stands firm on its proposal for revenue notes, holding these are adequate security and subject to less political attack in Oregon than general obligation bonds.

What PWA will do no one knows. It has authorized a \$10,000,000 road program in Colorado but that state is to furnish general obligation bonds for its \$7,000,000 advance. It seems doubtful if PWA will be content with less security than offered in other states.

If the five bridge applications hang up on the question of security, the state highway commission will be forced to face square what its move will be. It has legal authority to issue the necessary bonds; the 1933 legislature issued a resolution against issuing more highway bonds in 1932-1934 but specifically exempted bonds issued to match federal moneys. The commission, furthermore, through all the four years of distress in the state has bonded debt has steadily declined in the last four years for while \$1,500,000 net in bonds have been issued, the commission has kept its steady maintenance of bonds issued before 1929.

The note vs. bond question is a key one to the entire \$15,000,000 highway program proposed by Governor McCall and approved by the highway commission. As surely if the federal government would not accept revenue notes on the almost self-liquidating coast bridges, it would demand better security on a \$15,000,000 road program which would provide no sources of liquidation whatever.

Other questions by P. W. A. Deemed Minor
Three other questions asked in the PWA communication are all regarded as minor and easily answered by state highway officials. One question concerns the general fund and an inquiry whether or not the state will have a balanced budget by 1934. Inasmuch as the book deficit of the state has markedly declined the last biennium, a satisfactory answer here seems certain.

The second inquiry concerns a reconciliation of certain highway figures in which the application shows higher expenditures in 1931 and 1932 than income. The third question asks for an explanation of the state highway fund balance of July 31, 1933, which stood at \$2,678,033. All of these inquiries can be and were readily and favorably answered.

The last and first Washington communication indicates clearly the long delayed five-bridge applications are nearing a decision from PWA. If the notes are accepted to secure Oregon's loan, it is safe to predict early approval of the projects is at hand. If not, the Oregon state highway commission must decide forthwith whether it shall seek aid in the last four years, to obtain huge federal grants—\$6,000,000 alone in 1933—without putting out any match money whatever.

paying fees required by the statute.

The petition was filed by Ralph Staehl, manager of the Allied Truck Owners, Inc. He declared that the state already had lost approximately \$500,000 because of the Thomas moratorium and would continue to lose a large amount of money unless the petition of the plaintiffs is granted.

Another suit to collect losses from Thomas' bondsmen will be filed soon, Staehl said.

From the opposite side of the battle line came a statement from A. C. Anderson, president of the Truck Owners and Farmers' Protective association, that his association will institute legal proceedings on behalf of the state of Oregon and against the large Portland operators to collect large sums which he declares are owed to the state from the big truck interests in connection with the motor transportation act.

Anderson points out that the income which the state hoped to derive from the bill for 1934 was \$650,000, but that allied truck interests declare the state will lose \$500,000 as result of cutting off the small truck income.

READING COURSE OF LIBRARY DISCUSSED

Recent adoption by the Oregon state library of a free reading course for unemployed, entered prominently into the discussions at the convention of the American Library association held in Chicago recently, according to Miss Harriett Long, State Librarian.

Miss Long declared that librarians attended the meeting from every state in the union and the discussions covered a wide variety of subjects.

The librarians of eastern states were much interested in what the Oregon state library is doing for the unemployed. Miss Long said, "and a number of them intend to adopt the Oregon plan." Miss Long was elected a member of the association council.

Under the Oregon plan free reading courses are provided for all persons in the rural districts who are unable to obtain instruction through other sources. Approximately 700 persons are enrolled.

Linn Jones conferred with Governor Meier Monday as to the advisability of resigning temporarily as secretary of the State Board of Pharmacy, withdrawing his resignation as state senator from Clackamas county, and serving during the special legislative session which opens here November 20.

CCC CAMP WAGES BASIS OF DISPUTE

Mott Asked to Intercede in Workers' Claim \$1.20 Hour is Required

Congressman James W. Mott's office has been the clearing center in recent days for some controversy between the Salem Carpenters' union and the federal re-employment office here. The difficulty arose when a number of carpenters were hired from the local office to work on CCC camps near Detroit at \$5 a day. Union carpenters here protested that the rate should be \$1.20 an hour and got Mott to wire Washington.

Mott this week end received the following message from Robert Fechner, director, emergency conservation work:
"Relative your wire secretary of labor, civil conservation corps not under public works regulations. Setup for construction on camps is that prevailing rate of wages is to be paid and competent building trades mechanics employed if union agreements exist with employers in locality then union scale is to be recognized as prevailing scale."

In addition he received the following telegram from Isador Lubkin, commissioner of labor statistics:
"Re your telegram to secretary of labor today wage rate of \$1.20 an hour is required for skilled labor in northern zone on projects financed by appropriations from public work administration. However, work at CCC camps is under jurisdiction of civilian conservation corps. I am referring your telegram to Mr. Fechner, director of the CCC in Washington."
