Young Brown Hurt—Severe head and leg injuries suffered by Robert "Duke" Brown, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Brown, 2150 Center street, who was struck Monday by an automobile driven by Carol Madson, will keep him in bed for a few days and necessitate his using crutches for a short time. It was reported yesterday, foot visibility was blamed for the accident, which occurred on State near Winter street. The lad was taken home by Madson and L. Feaght, who was driving behind Madson's car.

Armistice, Banner Up—Stringing of a big banner across Court street at High yesterday signalled the approach of the Capital Post No. 9, American Legion, Armistice day celebration which, beginning the night of November 10 with a dance and football game, and progress through November 11 with a parade, patriotic exercises and another game. The celebration committee of which Dr. Laban A. Steeves is chairman is scheduled to convene again Thursday night to outline final plans.

New Trial Asked—A new trial in the recently non-suited case of Lucy Dawes against William W. Allen was asked in circuit court. She sued for \$75,000 damages for alleged breach of contract by the defendant physician. Errors of the court in refusing to allow Dr. Jenner to testify, in refusing to allow the case to go to the jury, insufficiency of evidence to justify the verdict and for granting the defendant's motion for a non-suit were basis for demanding new trial.

Turner Candidacy Rumored—Reports were current here Tuesday that Senator Wheeler of Lane county was being urged to enter the contest for representative in congress from the first congressional district at the republican primary election next May. Civil Business Good—Seven civil cases were filed in justice court yesterday, an unusual number for one day. They were all for money alleged due for goods sold or services, and ranged in size from a few dollars to about \$100.

ELLIS REPORTS ON PROGRESS OF NRA
More than 3,000,000 persons have been put to work in the United States in recent months as a direct result of the NRA, the total wage volume has increased approximately 20 per cent throughout the nation, members of the Salem Kiwanis club were told at their weekly luncheon meeting yesterday by William P. Ellis, head of the local committee. In Salem 200 persons have been given permanent employment, payrolls have been increased and more than 2000 individuals placed at work, he said.

Patience, charity and constructive criticism with the NRA were asked by the local chairman, who pointed out that certain delays have been unavoidable, that many may be laid at the door of capital and labor disputes and that rapid adjustments, though often faulty, can be made more equitable when just criticisms are taken to the right source.

Ralph Cooley, chairman of the local buy now campaign, declared that the success of the NRA from now on is up to the buying public.

FLAX PRODUCTION IS GIVEN IMPETUS

to have a tremendously important bearing on future crops, both as to yield per acre and fibre content of the straw, the industry leaders declare.

Some interesting data on the flax crops grown in Salem for the last nine years has been worked out by L. L. Laws of the prison flax plant and shows that gross returns ran all the way from \$12.38 per acre in 1925 to \$32.55 in 1930. The average price per ton in 1925 was \$31.60, in 1933 that price had dropped to \$19.41. The highest average price was \$37.20, reached in 1926, when 1644 acres of flax harvested out 2,376 tons.

The past season, only 461 acres of flax was planted, with the yield 940 tons and the gross return per acre \$39.57. For the nine years, the average yield per acre has been 1.75 tons; the average cost of planting seed per acre has been \$5.15 and the average cost of pulling the flax has been \$16.15. The average cash return per acre in the nine-year period has been \$40.35, as the gross return per acre was \$56.50.

At the present time, it is estimated there is only a \$11 per acre cash expense to flax, with \$4 for this for planting seed and \$7 for pulling.

Mr. Laws' statistics show that the average selling prices of flax products for the years 1927 to 1933, inclusive, ranged from 10 to 17 cents in 1933 to 22 to 28 cents in 1928 for fibre. The spread in prices is according to grades. Mill seed averaged a low of \$1.25 per bushel in 1932 and a high of \$3.25 per bushel in 1928. Upholstery tow brought \$30 per ton in 1927, dropped to \$70 in 1928; head at \$60 in 1929 and 1930; was \$55 in 1931; and hit lows of \$45 per ton in 1932 and 1933.

MINERS UNCERTAIN AS RAISE GRANTED

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 31. (AP)—Great confusion prevailed tonight in the ranks of 20,000 idle employees of steel-owned (captive) soft coal mines, as they received "definite" orders from high union leaders to return to the pits without formal recognition of the United Mine Workers of America.

If obeyed, the order, made in conformance with an agreement with President Roosevelt yesterday, would mean a minimum wage of \$4.36 a day for each man—operators say more than \$90,000 a day in pay.

This is an increase of more than 50 cents a day for every man and in addition the miners are promised an opportunity to elect representatives to negotiate contracts with their employers.

Nevertheless, Martin F. Ryan, "insurgent" leader who has been adamant that his followers not return until "Frick signs the union," termed the President's agreement "no agreement at all" and predicted none of the H. C. Frick Coke company mines will be reopened.

handful and estimated to be worth \$75,000 have been taken from the Arrowhead mine since last Friday when two prospectors made a strike which may prove one of the richest in southwestern Colorado, mining men learned tonight.

In the vaults of a bank here the men have cached sacks of gold ore running from \$10 to \$30 a pound and mining men said the strike may have uncovered the old May Day vein, one of the richest in the state from which a huge fortune in gold was taken. Prospectors have been searching for an outcropping of the May Day vein for 50 years.

The two prospectors, C. H. Starr and O. W. Gilmore, have been working the claim by hand and because of the value of the ore have moved it to bank vaults in small lots almost as soon as it was mined.
