The most natural in her role is Ruth Versteeg as Phyllis Stockbridge, the "other woman" in the Sayles' heart affairs. This young woman is both beautiful and sincere in her acting and gives an outstanding performance.

Keith Middleton looks a little young for his role as a father but has a pleasing voice and good stage presence. Gladys Hughes is charming as Mrs. Sayles, the club woman who neglects her home and child to save humanity.

Kathryn Rowe has the most difficult role of all as the neglected daughter who makes a mis-step. At times she is natural and charming. In some scenes her acting is overdone and too heavy. However, she gives a creditable performance.

Ward Horn as the poet and lover of Carol Sayles gets plenty of laughs although sometimes not in the right places. Howard Amend in the role of the butler is excellent, handling his small part with deference and keeping modestly in the background unless his chance to shine comes along. Then his poetry is side-splitting and he takes and holds the center stage.

"Modern Medley" is a bold experiment for an amateur group, but those who have seen it believe the experiment to be successful. Perry Prescott Reigleman is the director.
