

ACTION SOUGHT IN WATER DEAL

Three Resolutions Aim at
Speeding Up Program;
No Charges Aired

"That the state legislature be asked to revise the law which now prohibits municipalities selling their bonds below 95, and give them permission to sell at a lower figure where federal aid is involved."

Edward Rostein, chairman of the city water board, sounded the keynote of the meeting in the opening address when he declared: "What we want to do tonight is to try to form a united front of the chamber of commerce and business men's league back of the mayor and city council so they will not be so timid about getting down to business about a price we are willing to pay for the local plant. . . . Our people are crying for work and our business houses certainly can use more business. A million and a half in new construction going on in Salem would take up the unemployed and make buyers of them in place of beggars. . . . Two-thirds of this money going for labor would mean at least fifty millions in business for the local merchants."

Mayor Douglas McKay spoke briefly, asserting that the water question was settled when the people voted \$2,500,000 in bonds for the project.

Summary of Program
Outlined by Kowitz.

Explaining terms of the federal allotment, City Attorney Chris J. Kowitz stated that if purchase of the present water plant could not be effected under present loan terms, alternatives were: Seeking an RFC loan, getting the federal government to undertake the construction program, having the city assume payment of the Oregon-Washington Water Service company's bonds, or having the legislature lower the price at which city bonds can be sold. "The water committee has felt a direct deal would be the quickest way out," Kowitz concluded.

Pointing to the special session of the legislature convening here November 20, Representative Abrams declared "no question" that in his dealings with striking employees at Edgewater, N. J., Ford had recognized and put into effect the principle of collective bargaining.

Hugh S. Johnson, the NRA director, last week took the position that Ford was not eligible for government aid because he said, Edsel Ford had told him the company would remain unalterably opposed to collective bargaining.

The assertion by Senator Wagner that this stand was now reversed seemed to leave no room for doubt that Ford was regarded officially as complying with the automobile code.

"We've been cursed and damned and taken into too courts," declared Alderman Henry Vandevort regarding the water matter, "and then damned because we didn't get anywhere. If you'll get the business men and bankers behind us, the council'll see somewhere."

Although it was pointed out the city recently was unable to obtain bidders for purchase of \$25,000 in sewer bonds, Frank Perket asked, "Wouldn't it be a good idea to put out a feeler for a popular loan of \$1,000,000?"

Don Kalisher, state prison parole officer, drew applause when he declared it "a shame the people of Salem don't rise en masse against this water system."

Explanations of the status of the water negotiations were tendered by Alderman S. A. Hughes and Fred Williams, ex-city attorney, and criticisms by Mr. Leavenworth. John W. Cunningham, who estimated cost of the mountain water system for the city, was present to answer questions.

Derby, Williams and Kowitz were delegated to draw up the resolution to the congressmen for presentation at the council meeting Monday night, which the audience last night voted to attend.

**Fewer Children
Found in Census**

A total of 17,296 children had been counted in the Marion county school census yesterday with several districts not yet tallied. The total for last year was 23,223 or 113 more than are listed to date this year. Although when complete figures are available they may equal or exceed last year's, yesterday's total was submitted to be county budget committee to be used in making up the levy for county school and library funds.

The case for the state occupied much of the day with George Sucevich, father of the boy, who was also riding with Warren at the time of the fatal accident, as one of the major witnesses.

FORESTER MAY BE GIVEN NEW POWER

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 2 (AP)—Members of a committee appointed by Governor Meier to study plans for making fire prevention work in Oregon more effective met here today.

Expressing the belief that such disastrous fires as the coast range fire in Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill counties which destroyed millions of feet of valuable timber, could be prevented, the committee members decided at today's meeting to go before the special session of the legislature this month with a new law giving the state forester more authority.

Members present at the meeting were C. J. Buck, regional forester for Portland for the United States forest service; Lynn Cronmiller, state forester, and Richard E. McArdle, of the forest service, representing T. T. Munger, director of the Pacific northwest forest experiment station, who is now in the east.

The additional authority to be sought for the state forester would enable him and his wardens to enter the woods during the forest fire season and force all logging operations to stop until the hazard has passed. Cronmiller pointed out that the Tillamook fire would not have occurred if logging could have been stopped by law.

WARNER TO SPEAK ON ARMISTICE DAY

Harold D. Warner of Pendleton, state commander of the American Legion, has definitely been secured as the speaker at the Armistice day exercises in the armory here a week from Saturday in conjunction with Capital Post No. 4 celebration, it was announced last night by Dr. Laban A. Steeves, celebration chairman. At the same time, G. C. Ward, publicity chairman, reported that plans were complete for one of the best Armistice programs ever held here.

Celebration plans will be announced in detail next week when an intensive publicity campaign will be started. They will include theatre and dance programs November 10 and 11, the Williamette-SONS football game the night of November 10 and the Parrish-Leslie junior high game the following night.

education board. Inasmuch as this is \$67,000, a basic similar to that of last year \$75,000 will be added to the taxes for county purposes to be levied.

There is another fly in the county's tax outlook for 1934: the necessity that the 1934 state tax of \$145,000 for this county be raised by a tax on real property. Last year the court punted up this money from cash funds saved in former years and kept intact in the roads and highways fund. This saved county taxpayers about three mills on real property. The budget makers feel such a relief can no longer be afforded so next year the \$145,000 goes back on property, increasing realty taxes by that amount.

**Courthouse Pay Put
Back to 1932 Scale**

The budgeters agreed on four other major revisions:

1. Salaries throughout the courthouse were restored to the 1932 scale, the 10 per cent temporary waivers obtained for this year being abolished. Increased costs of living were held by the budget makers to necessitate this change. This increase added \$6000 to the budget.

2. The sum of \$2000 was set aside as a fund to build a vault for permanent records at the courthouse.

3. The fund for insane examinations and care of the insane who have no dependents was boosted from \$10,000 to \$15,000.

4. Because of increasing relief needs, the fund for poor assistance was increased from \$40,000 to \$50,000.

One new item in this year's budget was one of \$5000 for rebate on taxes paid in advance. Under a law effective January 1, 1934, taxpayers are to pay realty taxes quarterly and are to receive a two per cent discount for payment by the due date. The \$5000 item is the estimated rebate the county will have to make on its share of the tax roll paid when due.

For roads, including bridges, market roads, country roads and highways, the budget makers agreed upon an outlay of \$219,000 in 1934. Of this sum, \$103,000 will come from licenses, the county's share of the state gas tax and other miscellaneous revenue, leaving only \$116,000 to be raised by the county for roads by direct taxation.

**Match Money Won't
Come From Taxes**

It is understood, however, that \$100,000 pledged as match money by the county for the North Santiam road will be added to this outlay but none of the money will come from direct taxation. Instead balances accrued in the road funds over the last decade will be tapped to make this match money payment.

Members of the budget committee, aside from the county court, were Ray Glatt, Woodburn, chairman; M. G. Gunderson, Silverton; E. L. Wieder, Salem.

Mr. Wieder said that the members of the committee are needed to help on the budget found no provision for protection of delinquent tax records and for registration cards from loss or damage by fire. The loss to the county in case these records were destroyed would be impossible to estimate.

So the members recommended to the county court some provision for protection of these records, both permanently and in the daily use, against fire-damage.

suspension pending President Roosevelt's expression of attitude on their demands, there was renewed picketing in Minnesota, Iowa and South Dakota.

Leaders in the strike movement declared there would be no compromise from their demands for far licensing, controlled inflation of the currency, and quick mortgage relief, carried to Washington by the governors.

After threats of "open warfare" at Uniontown, Pa., it was announced a delegation of striking coal miners from the region would be received by President Roosevelt today. The miners had forecast serious trouble if idle coal mines were opened before they received an understanding of "peace plan" drafted by the President and the mine operators.

Gangster to be Held Murderer, Air Liner Crash

CHICAGO, Nov. 2. (AP) — The Tribune says tonight it learned from an authoritative source that department of justice agents are seeking a gangster whose name was not disclosed and plan to charge him with the murder of seven persons killed October 10 when a transcontinental air liner crashed near Chesterton, Ind., after an explosion.

Department of justice agents declined to comment on the Tribune's story.

EXTREMES NOTED, OCTOBER WEATHER

While October was generally cloudy and exceeded the mean average of rainfall by 1.91 inches, it was a month of extremes in temperatures, the local weather observer announced last night. The maximum thermometer reading for the month was 89 degrees, recorded October 7, and the minimum, 26, on October 23. The mean temperature was 54.33 degrees, mean maximum 66 and mean minimum 42.64.

There were 11 cloudy days, nine partly cloudy and 11 clear. While total rainfall was 3.83 inches, two-thirds of which was recorded over the past weekend, it was exceeded by at least ten previous Octobers; the wettest on record was October 1924, when 8.31 inches of rain fell.

CHRISTIAN CHURCH GROUP TO GATHER
