

Fifty-eight schools in Marion county, aside from those having city water supplies, now have drinking water of "A" quality, Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer has reported in announcing results to date of the voluntary water testing plan instituted this year. Another 40 schools that have submitted water samples to the state health department have been found to have doubtful or definitely contaminated supplies, while no reports have been received from 19.
