PLAN RELIEF WORK ON COUNTY ROADS

With a view to lining up relief work to be financed by federal funds this winter the county court yesterday inspected several county roads which are believed to offer employment for the county's needy. The new setup requires that the formal application be filed with the relief committee and a formal order granted authorizing the work. The application forms, which have been forwarded to the court, call for data regarding location and nature of the roads, number of men who can be employed, estimated costs and numerous other details.

No decision has yet been reached by the court as to what jobs will be listed and how soon relief work can be put under way. Some time probably will elapse between submission of applications and granting of permits, it is expected.

WATER SYSTEM AT DALLAS PAYS AHEAD

DALLAS, Nov. 7.—A check up on the municipally owned water system here shows that the city is far ahead of schedule on retiring the bonds.

The water system was purchased in September, 1931 at a cost of \$100,000, and the city took possession of the plant on November 1, 1931. The first installment of the bonds issued at this time was to fall due in October 1933. The city retired \$4000 of these bonds during 1932 and \$10,000 so far this year, making a total of \$14,000 and interest paid to date. This leaves a balance of \$106,000 out of the original bond issue.

Members of the city council filed notice of the city tax levy for 1934 with the county clerk and assessor following the council meeting Monday night. A total of \$25,501 is being levied for city purposes.

HOME SHAVING IS BLAMED UPON WAR

The war did it—taught men to shave themselves—declared Leon W. DuBois, veteran Salem barber, yesterday in commenting on the trend of the barbering business. Though shaves don't net the straight edge wielders much profit, they do serve well to fill in between customers wanting haircuts, DuBois said.

"Yes, shaves off since the world war," he went on. "So many boys in the trenches got used to shaving themselves, cold water and all, that they've just continued to do so, especially since they generally have modern homes and conveniences now." Women's hair-cutting, he indicated, has somewhat made up for the dearth of shaving trade.

DuBois, who since October 14, 1927, has operated the barber shop in the Masonic building basement, came to Salem in 1921 from Tacoma, Wash.

City Liquor Store, Plan At Klamath

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 7. (AP) — A legal test of the home rule provisions of the state constitution relating to the regulation of liquor as suggested by Dr. W. S. Knox, chairman of a committee on liquor control appointed by Governor Julius L. Meier, will be welcomed by Klamath Falls, Mayor W. E. Mahoney said today.

The city council passed an ordinance last night designed to put into effect city liquor control, and this was construed as a challenge to the right of the state to establish liquor stores here as proposed by the Knox commission.

The ordinance provides for the city licensing of private liquor establishments, for the prohibition of the saloon and for the limiting of "hard" liquor consumption to the home. In the preamble of the ordinance the home rule provision of the state constitution is included.

Mayor Mahoney said that if the legislature at its pending special session, adopts the Knox committee plan to establish state liquor stores, and the state attempts to set up a liquor store in Klamath Falls, the city will probably seek an injunction.

AUTOGIRO TO FLY ABOVE CITY TODAY

Today Salem will see an autogiro airplane in flight when William A. Campbell flies over the campus of Willamette university about noon. He is to give a lecture at the chapel at 11:20 and after he concludes will fly his plane about the university. His lecture treats on the evolution of flying, the theory of autogiro, and the history of the autogiro. In the summer of 1932 he climbed 20,400 feet high in the machine he is bring to Salem.

Mr. Campbell's lecture on aviation has been delivered at such leading colleges as Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Carnegie Tech., University of Pittsburgh, Harvard and Syracuse university, Tulane, University of Tennessee, Southern Methodist university and Rice institute, as well as at more than 500 different public high and junior high schools.

closed. LaGuardia tore a badge from the coat of a Tammany worker in a scuffle at a voting place.

From district ward heeler to the top of the ticket the disorder spread. Robert Minor, communist candidate for mayor, was tossed into the street by thugs, and William M. Chadbourn, LaGuardia's manager, was arrested for striking an election official.

The greatest peace time army in the city's history—19,000 policemen and 1700 deputy attorneys general—fought to preserve order from the time the polls opened at 6 a. m. Their greatest task was in the lower east side and in Harlem, where street fighting was heavy throughout the day.

One point fusion backers telephoned Chief Inspector John O'Brien and threatened to appeal to Governor Herbert H. Lehman for aid unless the police awoke the disturbances more rapidly. Tammany chieftains denied they were responsible for the rioting and pointed out that the police under Commissioner James S. Bolan, appointed by the mayor, were striving with all their power to maintain order.

The boldest bit of thuggery was attempted by two machine loads of mobsters who sought to release a repeater arrested by police.

Separate State Auto Department Being Suggested

Creation of a state motor vehicle department, to include administration of all legislation involving the operation of buses and trucks, separate from the office of the secretary of state and public utility commissioner, was suggested by update legislators here during the past few days.
