BUTTER PURCHASES FOR RELIEF START Chicago Market Basis; Meat Showing Up Better as Calves Cleaned Up PORTLAND, Nov. 8. (AP)—Roy Martindale, head of the Portland produce exchange, announced today that the dairy marketing corporation, a government organization, was to begin buying butter on the local market for government account today. Purchases for the time being will be made only of fresh curings. All that is offered will be bought on the basis of the Chicago market, around 23 cents a pound for extras. The government will not buy storage stock at this time, hoping to relieve the general surplus by taking considerable fresh butter off the market. Prices here have been holding steady recently in anticipation of the government's buying operations.

Speculators Resume Buying

WHEAT LOFED 4C; PROFITS ARE TAKEN

CHICAGO, Nov. 8. (AP)—Greatly enlarged speculative buying rushed grain values up late today, with wheat scoring an overnight jump of nearly 4 cents a bushel. Administration methods for higher agricultural prices received much of the credit from leading trade authorities, the day's top figures for grains being reached following announcement the United States government would furnish 5,500,000 bushels of wheat to livestock in drought areas west and southwest. Earlier, the grain markets were strongly influenced upward by election results which made certain that prohibition would be ended next month and there was more notice taken of advancing prices for gold, sterling and francs. Because of big profit-taking sales at the last, the cereal grains were not maintained in full, wheat closed unsettled, 1 3/4-2 1/4 cents above yesterday's finish, corn 1 1/4-1 1/2 up, oats 1 1/4-1 1/2 advanced. LATE 1 TO 5 POINT RISE MADE, STOCKS

NEW YORK, Nov. 8. (AP)—Speculative markets pushed upward today as dollar depreciation was extended. Stocks confined their rally largely to the last hour when prices rose 1 to around 5 points after wheat made a good advance and cotton climbed substantially, notwithstanding the estimate of a larger crop than a year ago. Stocks profiting by particularly brisk demand included American Telephone, up more than 5 net; case, up nearly 5; New York Central, up 3. Allied Chemical, up 4, and Montgomery Ward, up 2 on the strength of its October sales report. U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, American Can, Westinghouse, Du Pont, National Distillers, a merger, a Smelter, Cerro De Pasco, Chrysler and Sears and Roebuck improved 2 to 3. General Motors, after a slow start, crossed 30 for a net gain of 1 1/2. General Electric, Eastman, Auburn, Johns-Manville, International Silver, Industrial Union, U. S. Smelting, Canada Dry and Union Pacific gained 1 to 3 net. Transactions totaled 1,811,331 shares.

Buying Price on Dressed Turkeys In Country Down

PORTLAND, Nov. 8. (AP)—The buying price on dressed turkeys at country points, for the Thanksgiving trade, has been cut to 16 cents a pound for No. 1 toms and hens at Pacific northwest sources, according to word received by the trade here today. Medium grade birds were three cents less at 13 cents, and No. 2 grade was quoted at 10 cents a pound. The delivered price in Portland was set at one cent a pound above these figures. Resales to retailers were going at a nominal 20 cent top for No. 1 birds. The demand was not very brisk. Conditions here reflected a reported drop on the Los Angeles market to 20 cents a pound flat for No. 1 dressed birds, and it was said the San Francisco price was expected to be on the same basis today.
