

HOLMAN AVERS HE IS IGNORED

Board of Control Matters Basis of Complaint; Meier Answers

plant and modern surgery already are available.
Governor Meier who replied to Holman by calling attention to excerpts from the minutes of a board of control meeting held here on May 15 of this year.

"I am in receipt of your letter of November 8 with reference to the possible participation of the state in the federal reconstruction program, in which you say that all knowledge concerning this matter has been kept from you and that the heads of the state institutions have not been consulted in the program."
"In answer, I refer you to the following excerpt from the minutes of the board of control of May 15, at which meeting you were present:

"Mr. Einzig advised that he had been appointed by the governor to make a survey for him of the needs of the state institutions. At this meeting Mr. Einzig requested the suggestion of the members of the board as to building projects that may be sponsored by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation under the direction and supervision of the governor."
"On about May 16 every state institution head was contacted by Mr. Einzig either in writing or by telephone as to the needs of his institution. The replies to Mr. Einzig's inquiry are available for reference in the files of the board of control."
The original state building program also includes construction of a state library in Salem at a cost of \$350,000 and a combined hospital, dining hall and refrigerating plant at the state penitentiary at an outlay of \$290,000.
The board of control has proposed that the state buildings be constructed by the federal government and that the argument of the loss be possible on a rental basis covering a period of 25 years.
Salem architects will be asked to prepare plans and specifications for the local projects.

JOHNSON TALKS IN FARM STRIKE AREA

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 8 (AP)—General Hugh S. Johnson, industrial recovery administrator, invaded the home of the midwest farm strike today to appeal for support of the NRA and to discuss the most possible way out of this depression and to affirm that recovery program benefits were already on the way to the farmer.
As the fiery general drew his address before 4000 persons in Shrine auditorium to a close, there were bursts of applause from the most part, however, the audience listened without demonstration.
One heckler who attempted to interrupt was silenced when the general asked sharply:
"What better plan than Franklin Roosevelt's plan can you think of?"

Waywardness of Clocks Irrksome To Commissioner

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 8 (AP)—A vigorous protest against the waywardness of street clocks in the diversity of their announcements at a five month time was launched in the Portland city council today by City Commissioner R. E. Riley.
Suggesting that Commissioner O. R. Bean be directed to confer with the owners of street clocks and make arrangements by which the clocks can be regulated, Riley declared:
"No two of these clocks agree, and unless there is some regulation of them, the permits should be revoked. If the clocks cannot tell the correct time, they are not even a good advertisement."

World's Fair to Open Next Year If Solons Favor

CHICAGO, Nov. 8 (AP)—Official announcement that the world's fair will open next June 1 for a five months' run was made today by Rufus C. Dawes, president of the exposition.
As members of the world's fair association voted several days ago to hold the big show again next year, it was accepted then that it would re-open.
All that remains necessary to insure its passage of enabling legislation by the Illinois general assembly and fair officials believe that will be accomplished as a routine matter.
The exposition will close next Sunday for the winter.

Dr. Green Heads Veterinarians

REVIVAL OF PROHIBITION PARTY IS PLANNED

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 8 (AP)—Organization of the national prohibition party in every state was announced today by William D. Upshaw, 1932 presidential candidate for that party.
PORTLAND, Nov. 8 (AP)—A revival of the national prohibition party will be undertaken at once in Oregon, as well as in other states, it was declared here today by W. M. Heacock of Portland, provisional state chairman of that party. The party expects to have a complete ticket in the May primary election.
"Since both the republican and democratic parties have surrendered to the liquor interests," he declared, "the drys now find themselves virtually disfranchised."
The utility of electing dry men in wet parties, and of "voting for personalities instead of principles," has been thoroughly demonstrated," Heacock said, in commenting upon overthrow of the 18th amendment by the vote of three states yesterday.

Appraisers Value D'Arcy Estate at Total of \$126,348

Salem property and personal effects comprised the entire estate of the late Judge Peter H. D'Arcy which was appraised at \$126,348.50. W. S. Walton, L. P. Aldrich and Lyle Bartholomew filed their appraisal with the county clerk yesterday.
The D'Arcy residence on State street was one of the smaller items, appraised at \$5,500. The largest item was a store building and lot on North Liberty street appraised at \$35,000. Other buildings and lots listed were the Labor temple, \$20,000; D'Arcy building, \$22,500; and building 453-455 Court street, \$17,500. Cash in the bank was \$25,398.53.

Jury Gets Case Of Lee Douglas In Dallas Court

DALLAS, Nov. 8. (Special)—Judge Arlie G. Walker turned the case of the state against Lee Douglas, on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, over to the jury at 2:05 this afternoon. The second day of the trial passed more quickly than the first with all testimony being taken and the attorneys making their final arguments.
The first trial of Douglas on this charge resulted in a hung jury.
Roy Stalnaker of Independence, found guilty last week on a statutory charge was to be sentenced today but sentence was deferred until November 17.

21ST AMENDMENT FULL TEXT GIVEN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (AP)—The following is the text of the 21st amendment to the constitution which voters have decided should replace the 18th amendment:
Joint resolution:
Proposing an amendment to the constitution of the United States.
Resolved, by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled (two-thirds of each house concurring therein).
That the following article is hereby proposed as an amendment to the constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the constitution when ratified by conventions in three-fourths of the several states:
Section 1. The 18th article of amendment to the constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.
Section 2. The transportation or importation into any state, territory or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.
Section 3. This article shall be operative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the constitution by convention in the several states, as provided in the constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the states by the congress.

FOUR MILLION MEN TO GET JOBS, PLAN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (AP)—The administration today broadened and liberalized its winter unemployment relief program with an announcement from the White House that \$400,000,000 would be allotted from public works funds to a newly created civil works administration to give 4,000,000 men work.

At the White House, it was said two million of those now employed on a work relief basis by local and state relief agencies that are receiving federal aid, would be put to work under the new plan November 16 and 2,000,000 others, now out of employment and receiving relief, would be "put back to work as soon thereafter as possible."
Harry L. Hopkins, head of the federal relief administration, was designated administrator for the new civil works division, which in effect would broaden the base of relief work.
