

MT. ANGEL ELECTS WEBB MAYOR AGAIN

MT. ANGEL, Nov. 9.—The city council at its regular meeting Monday evening held a hearing on the proposed city budget for 1934. Not a citizen appeared in

protest so the budget was approved and adopted as prepared by the budget committee, headed by Joseph J. Keber. The budget totals about \$8800.

Results of the city election showed Dr. J. E. Webb, re-elected as mayor, with 179 votes; Alois Keber, treasurer, with 193 votes; Forrest J. Sanvork was elected recorder with 110 votes; P. N. Smith, present incumbent, received 102 votes. The three councilmen chosen were J. H. Bigler, 155

votes, O. L. Withers, 151 votes, and William Conrad, 169 votes. G. R. Williams, the other candidate, received 165 votes.

HOT LUNCHES FOR 60 PUPILS SERVED

By Monmouth Parent-Teacher, Says Report At Regular Meet

MONMOUTH, Nov. 9.—Monmouth's Parent-Teacher association met Tuesday night with a large attendance present. Mrs. L. E. Forbes, the president, presided. An interesting report of the recent state convention held in Salem was given by Mrs. V. V. Caldwell, secretary.

A hot-lunch dish is being served daily to more than 60 children in the training school, this being financed by the Parent-Teacher association with individual contributions. Sponsorship of the P-T. A. keeps the project in successful operation. Mrs. Forbes stated that many delegates whom she contacted at the P-T. A. convention were astounded to learn that this could be, and was, kept going without any charge to the children.

Project Started in 1932

Miss Effie Smith, who prepares cafeteria lunches for the training school faculty, also makes the hot soup for the children in the school kitchen. The project was tried out first in 1932 and was carried through the school year without a break until June 1. Mrs. J. B. Lorence is chairman of the committee in charge.

The program featured Book week, now being observed at the training school. Miss Clara Trotter, director, gave a short talk on training school. The final number was a short play presented by eighth grade children.

At the business session it was voted to contribute toward the traveling expenses of the state P-T. A. president; also voted to pay transportation of local delegates to the state convention.

At the November meeting of the city council, it was agreed that the bonds for beer vendors within the city should be fixed within 10 days or their places closed. The street committee was instructed to look into the proposition of fixing Piedmont avenue between Cascade drive and Rosemont and determine the extent of needed improvements to put it in good usable shape.

The bus owner, C. L. Beck, who has been operating on a 60 day trial, asked for a franchise, and the motion prevailed that one be granted him for a three year period, with an option for three years more if desired, the franchise to be not transferable.

In response to a previous request for permission to sell beer, the Riverside Grocery was granted that privilege, providing they put in extra lighting in the front of the store and comply with the law.

City Attorney Elmer Cook reported that the easements on streets and property vacated were drawn up and ready to be signed.

Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Dalke have purchased an acre of land between Cascade and Terrace drives and joining the Applewhite property and next to its acre. The Charles E. Stricklands have bought an acre or more and both families are planning to build on the land and make their homes there.

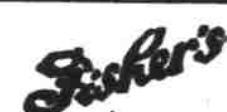
