

### ARMISTICE EVENTS START WITH PARADE

#### Silverton Program Leaves Afternoon Free for Big Football Tilt

SILVERTON, Nov. 9.—The local Legion post has prepared a full day for Armistice celebration at Silverton and has left the afternoon free so that those who will, and a large number have indicated their intention to do so, may attend the football game at Portland.

The day's observance opens with the parade which is scheduled to form at North Water and A streets and march along Water street to the armory where the program will be held. At the program the Dr. W. O. Livingston will offer the invocation and pronounce the benediction. Roy Hewitt, assistant to the attorney general, will be the speaker at the morning program. The Silverton school band, directed by Calvin Storey, will play "In Flanders Field." Mrs. William P. Scarth will sing, and Oliver Carpenter will give a group of hanjo solos.

The annual pot luck dinner of ex-service men and women will be held at noon at the armory and at night a "Memory Lane" dance will be the entertainment.

To Feed Legionnaires  
A potluck dinner at noon following the program in the morning, will be one of the features of the Armistice day observance at Silverton. The Legion Auxiliary, voted at its November meeting, to furnish meat, potatoes and coffee for the noon-day dinner. Others attending, and all ex-service men, Legionnaires, and Auxiliary members are invited, are asked to furnish pies, cakes, salads, and sandwiches.

Other affairs reported upon at the Auxiliary meeting include: Mrs. Ernest Starr, chairman of the child welfare work of the group, reported that 12 dresses had been completed and sent to the veteran's children's home. Mrs. George Towe, chairman of the sewing committee, reported on a quilt completed, another well under way and others planned for. The sewing club will continue making quilts for charitable purposes during the winter. The unit also endorsed the sale of Christmas seals and voted to support the sale materially. Mrs. R. E. Kleinrose is in charge of the local tuberculosis seal sale.
