

TRAINING SCHOOL UNDER QUARANTINE

WOODBURN, Nov. 24.—The state training school near here has been under quarantine for nearly a week, according to word. There are about 17 cases of disease.

EDWARD HUG DIES; FUNERAL IS SUNDAY

SILVERTON, Nov. 24.—Edward HUG, 74, died at his home at Rocky Four Corners, east of here, early Friday morning. Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Monitor road, with Rev. Dobberfuhl officiating.

Edward Hug was born in Friebeel, Germany, February 24, 1859, and came to Iowa in 1888, where in 1889 he married Mary Bauer of Algona, Iowa. They came to Silvertown in 1909 and have since resided here.

Besides the widow, he leaves several brothers: William and Emil of Mt. Angel, Fred of Cedar Falls, Iowa, and George and Adolph in Germany.

WEST SALEM, Nov. 24.—At a special emergency called meeting of the city council early Thursday night the city "dads" approved a petition for funds from the Polk county civil works administration for drainage of the swampy lands at the foot of Kingwood terrace.

During the day the council surveyed the lake and swampy area and estimated the probable expense of suitable drainage. It is deemed advisable that the project should include several laterals from the swamp to the river with intervening street drainage made available to the filling mains through curb outlets.

Before County Board Walter Gerth rushed the petition to the 8 o'clock meeting of the county court and CWA committee for consideration.

Should the project be approved it is probable that work might be started next week with local laborers being employed.
