WAR THREAT SEEN BY PEACE WORKER

Reduction of Armament is Plea of Miss Rankin; To Speak Today

Every patriotic citizen should memorize the Kellogg Peace pact, is the firm belief of Miss Jeanette Rankin, first woman ever to be elected to the congress of the United States, who speaks this afternoon at 3 o'clock in the First Methodist church.

"And by a patriotic person, I mean anyone who works for humanity rather than for profits," Miss Rankin continued. She is a forceful speaker, even in informal conversation and her low, pleasing voice carries conviction.

Miss Rankin is an associate secretary of the National Council for Prevention of War and has been a member of the famous "peace lobby" in Washington for several years. The lecture tour which she is now making of the northwest is "something different" which she is just doing temporarily.

"Are we close to war now? Just as close as the munition makers and army and navy will let us be. It is true people are more aware of propaganda for war than they were ten years ago but if war actually comes, no previous training will matter. It must be prevented," Miss Rankin affirmed.

The depression, she said, has seemingly had no effect on military preparation as the United States is spending more than ever before. "Of course, capitalists realize that if war comes, society will be so disrupted that their profits will disappear just as they have in this post-war depression. Therefore they are anxious to avert it. The destruction of social order by war is much greater than the actual damage to property and loss of life."

Miss Rankin and the organization she represents hope to rouse people to action for practical reduction of armaments and promotion of "peace thinking." She urges her audiences to write to their congressmen and demand reduction of armament allotments.

A six months jail sentence and parole was given B. W. Tucker, 1655 North Capitol street, who pleaded guilty to issuing an N. S. F. check.
