Today The Oregon Statesman explains the bidding and play of one of the tournament hands played here November 21. Mrs. William H. Quinn makes the explanation. The hand was in boards numbered 1 and 14. Subsequently other hands will be explained.

North ♠ K 5 4 3 ♥ 6 4 3 ♦ K 5 4 2 ♣ 7 5 East ♠ A J 8 7 ♥ 5 4 3 2 ♦ A Q J 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2 ♣ A Q J 10 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2

South ♠ Q 6 2 ♥ Q J 10 9 ♦ 8 2 ♣ K 4 2

North dealer. No one vulnerable. Suggested bidding (Culbertson system): Pass West 2♣ North East Pass Pass 1♠ Pass 2♣ Pass 3NT

The play: The natural opening against a not-rump declaration is the queen of hearts, for a three-card honor sequence. East takes this with the king. East realizes that reentries must be made in dummy. Ten of clubs is led. South naturally plays low, so East covers with Jack. West leads jack of diamonds and East drops the 10.

Diamonds are led again from dummy. This time the 8 is dropped on the 9. Seven of diamonds led from dummy, queen takes in declarer's hand. Then North's king falls on the ace. East leads the 9 of clubs, covers with the queen and West leads the 10 of spades, finesse and South takes the trick with the queen. South returns a heart. East takes it with ace. Leads 6 of clubs, finesse 8 and captures South's king on the next lead of the ace.

On the 12th trick the jack of spades is finessed and six tricks are made. Of course the bidding of six is not justified—dummy's entry possibilities must be utilized to the fullest extent.

Mr. Work played the above hand in the position of East. His partner was Mr. Jacoby.

Old Age Pension Will be Delayed. Present Outlook Members of the house committee on counties and cities reached virtual agreement Tuesday that the operations of the old age pension law would have to be delayed unless some new source of revenue is found. County courts of the state find themselves unable to levy property taxes to meet the requirements of the act. It was stated by Earl Day, county judge of Jackson county. The courts have asked for the operation of the law to be deferred for two years. The committee will make a hunt for another revenue source other than the ad valorem tax, according to Don Ryan, chairman.

State Tax Levy To be Revealed Today; Increase The 1934 state tax levy is to be announced today, members of the state tax commission have advised. This is the last day on which the tax can be promulgated according to law. The levy is expected to total 6 per cent more than in 1933 since the state has been operating under a deficit for many years and must levy to the full extent of the constitutional restriction in order to reduce the deficit. State tax authorities declared yesterday the 1934 levy would probably impose a three-mill tax on all real property. By the end of 1934 the state deficit will probably be reduced to \$1,400,000 or nearly \$3,000,000 from the \$4,300,000 figure at the end of 1932.

COUNTY PREPARING TO HIRE MORE MEN

The Marion county will submit sufficient new civil works projects to employ the remaining 620 men of its quota by mid-December is evidenced by the daily stream of county, municipal and school officials conferring with Glenn C. Niles, CWA administrator, here regarding their plans. The smaller towns, notably Ainsworth, Woodburn and Hubbard, are shaping up projects so they will come in under the final relief quota.

Word is expected momentarily as to the wage scale for skilled CWA labor, Niles said last night. Lack of this information has delayed the start of the city hall project of laying a new concrete floor in fire department quarters. The city will have several street, creek and ditch, and sewer projects ready soon for submission to the CWA board. The Salem school board is working out another park and playground project for which it will ask approximately \$8000 in CWA funds which will go chiefly to labor.

Snowfall Noted At Silver Falls First snow of the season fell Monday night in the Silver Falls area, Alvi Love, Marion county relief worker, reported here yesterday on her return from a business visit in that vicinity. An inch of snow lay on the ground, she said. Snow on the Polk county hills yesterday from tall buildings here.

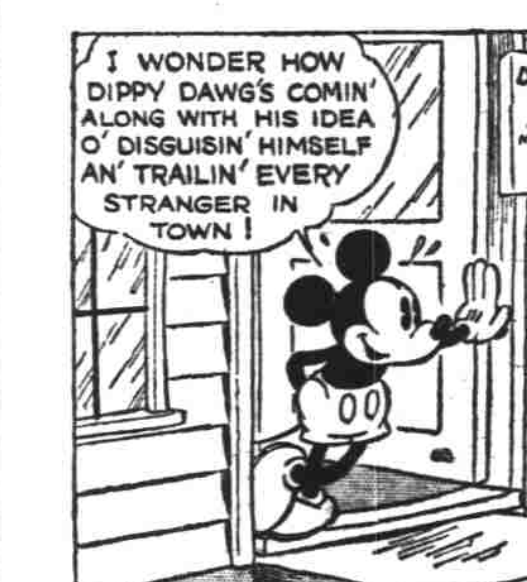
