

Local News Briefs

Utilities Railings—The state utilities commission yesterday granted the application of O. C. Smith of Eugene to operate as a common freight motor carrier between that city and Winchester bay. Another order approved the application of the state highway commission for permission to establish a crossing of the Nehalem secondary highway No. 102, under the tracks of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway in Washington county. The commission dismissed the application of J. H. Million of Eugene for permission to operate as anywhere for hire common passenger motor carrier.

Only One Case Pends—There is only one criminal case now pending in the state supreme court here, it was announced yesterday. This is the case of the state vs. Harry F. Riley, convicted of first degree murder in Harney county. Criminal cases have the right of way in the supreme court and the rules require that these cases shall be set for hearing within 60 days after an appeal is filed.

Assigns Judges—Chief Justice Rand of the state supreme court Wednesday assigned Circuit Judges Wilson of The Dalles and Bagley of Hillsboro to Multnomah county on December 5. Judge Latourette of Oregon City was assigned to Wasco county to hear the case of J. B. Lober against Charles Nelson, et al, in which Judge Wilson was disqualified.

Postpone Bond Tax—The senate yesterday postponed indefinitely a bill by Senator Dunne providing for levying a tax on interest on bonds, warrants and other evidences of indebtedness issued by the state and municipalities. Revenue derived from this tax would have been used for the relief of the unemployed.

Probate Order Granted—An order permitting Rebecca M. Thamer and W. L. Murray, administrators of the estate of John Murray, to sign a satisfaction of a \$2,000 mortgage, was granted in probate court yesterday. The mortgage was satisfied before the death of Murray, but his health would not permit him to sign the papers.

Commission Named—Governor Meier has appointed the five members of the Port of Arlington commission authorized by an act of the 1933 legislature. Members are W. A. Hartfield, Olex; Earl Hoag, Blalock, and Roy Kunsman, Frank Lewis and George Berry, all of Arlington.

Union Pays in Full—Union county yesterday sent to the state treasurer a check for \$16,000, which pays its second-half state taxes for 1933 in full. There is no due from second-half taxes approximately \$26,000. Officials said this was a much better record than last year, and indicated that conditions were improving.

Get Grade Crossing—The application of the Brix Logging company for permission to construct and maintain a crossing at grade across the Rocky Point county road in Washington county was approved by the utility commissioner yesterday.

Motor Case—Charles Glinther, charged with violation of the motor transportation act, having never applied for a license, was bound over to the grand jury Wednesday in justice court. He was released on his own recognizance.

Damage Asked—Damages of \$500 are asked by the guardian, Howard A. minor, by her guardian, from Sheriff A. C. Burk and the Salem Collections, Inc. The suit is the outgrowth of the confiscation of an automobile.

Divorce Asked—Cruel and inhuman treatment is charged in complaint for divorce filed in circuit court yesterday by Millie Elliott from her husband L. H. Elliott. The plaintiff asks \$150 attorney fees and restoration of her maiden name, Millie Hespeck.

Library Closes—Salem public library employees will spend Thanksgiving with their families or friends. Maud E. Covington, librarian, has announced that the library will be closed all day today.

No Classes at Y—Lobbies at the city Y. M. C. A. will be open today but all classes regularly scheduled for Thursday will be canceled in observance of Thanksgiving day.

According to the complaint, the bakery truck backed out of a parking place at the curb without the driver first ascertaining the condition of traffic and sustained a splintered arm, which will be permanently injured, the pleadings state.

Seeks Alimony Reduction—Ira R. Simmons, 30 year old defendant in a divorce action filed by his wife, Pamela A. Simmons, yesterday filed an affidavit in circuit court showing his gross income as \$40 monthly, in an attempt to offset a move by the plaintiff to secure more than \$15 monthly support money. The affidavit maintains in addition to the \$15 monthly payment, the plaintiff has been given a house in which she is living.

Alleged Forger Indicted—W. F. Ramp, warehouse operator at Brooks and a member of a well-known Marion county family, yesterday posted \$500 bond to guarantee his appearance in court to answer charges of forgery. Ramp was indicted Tuesday by the county grand jury. Ramp maintains ex-cercent in his employ defaced a check, making it appear the defendant forged the instrument.

Representative Wyers urged immediate consideration of the majority-minority reports Wednesday morning, contending that further delay was unwise. He was overruled and the debate was held up until Friday.

All sides on the Knox bill tacitly agreed Wednesday that the decision on the majority and minority reports would precipitate the final house debate on the liquor control measure, with the view of passing the enactment over to the senate before the week closed. The joint highway committee is in agreement that the mileage fees and the license charges of the bus and truck enactment of the regular session of 1933 will be unchanged. This means that contract haulers will be required to keep books and to pay 3-4 of a mill on each ton mile of goods carried. Obnoxious features of the 1933 law, apart from these major tax items, have been smoothed out or eliminated.

McKenzie Service To be Said Here At 3 p.m. Friday

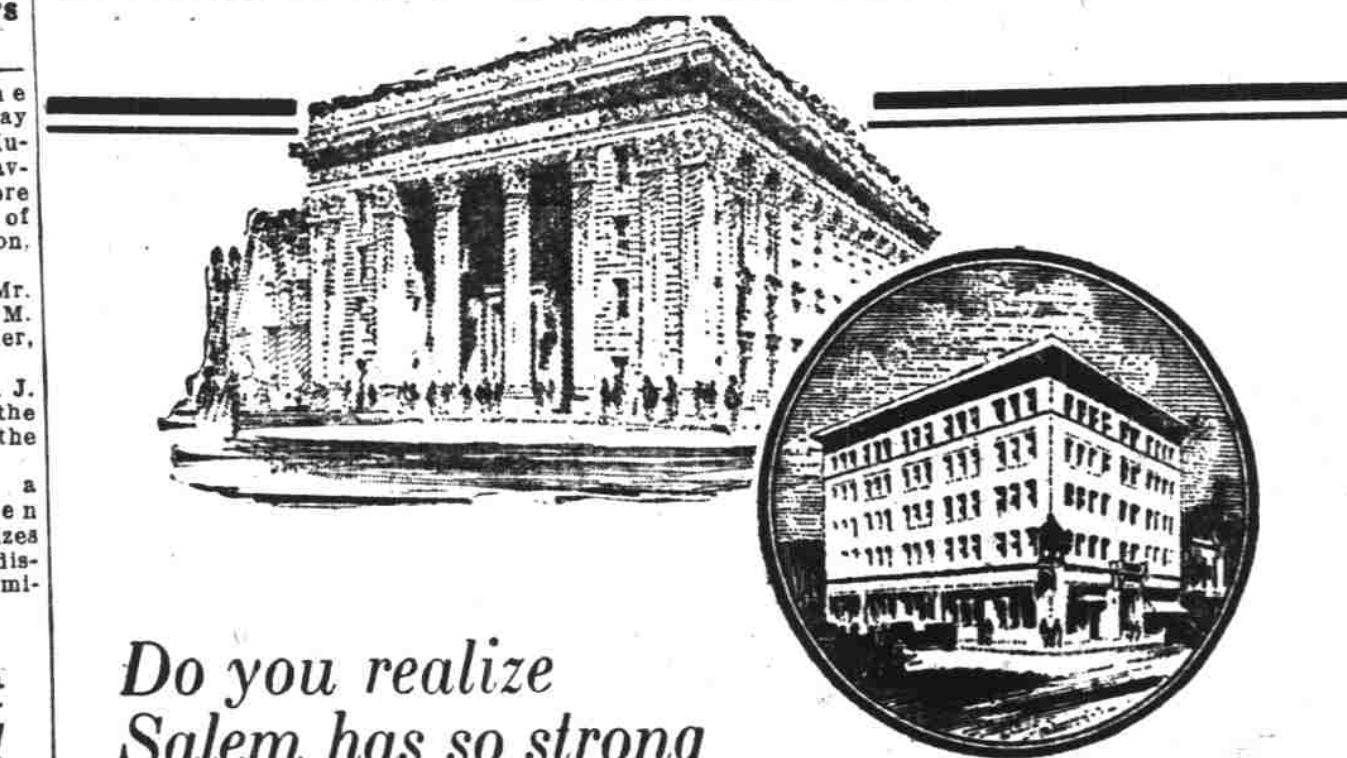
