CLOSE ON OATS IS UP NEARLY A CENT

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.-Wheat prices ran up 2 1/2 cents a bushel today and ended at virtually the top level reached. Sudden big bulges in the Argentine wheat market, together with a 2-cent rise of the Washington quotation, led gold, and further federal relief buying of wheat, were the chief stimulating factors. Buenos Aires wheat prices jumped 4 cents following unexpected changes of Argentine government agricultural and financial policy.

Wheat closed strong, 1 1/2-2 1/2 above yesterday's finish, corn unchanged to 1/4 higher, oats 1/4-1/2 up. Today's closing quotations: Wheat - December 83 3/4-3/4; May 87 1/2-1/2; July 87 1/2-1/2. PACIFIC CO-OP EGG PRICE COMES DOWN

PORTLAND, Nov. 19. (AP) - After an hour of trading, lower prices were named for eggs by the Pacific co-ops after being up against still lower priced sales by outsiders and private firms. Prices were down 1 cent all around except pullets.

Owing to the increase in production and the inability of the trade to clean up, creamery interests were asking the government to increase its next quota from 300 to 400 cubic daily. Some accumulations were shown. Practical cleanups of all live and dressed chickens received on the open market was suggested by the trade. Prices were showing no further changes. Ducks were cleaned up fairly well but few geese were received. First Lady apples of the season were reported from Bingen and priced nominally \$2 apple box.

Markets Firm As Turkey Talk Rules in Street

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (AP) - Although markets were too much preoccupied today with thoughts of the impending Thanksgiving feast to give much attention to business, their tone was one of firmness. U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, American Can, Westinghouse, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Standard Oil of New Jersey, Harvester, Santa Fe, New York Central, General Motors, Chrysler, Du Pont and Kennecott were up a point or thereabouts, while Case and Dome gained 2 each and Homestake, in one of its periodic excursions, scored 2 1/2. Utilities were little changed. Turnover of 75,190 shares was the smallest for a five-hour market in some time.
