

MOLALLA CORN DISPLAY OPENS

At High School Building Today; Generous Prizes Are Donated

MOLALLA, Nov. 30. — Prizes ranging from corn planters to free hair cuts have been donated by Molalla business men and seed houses for awards during Molalla's first corn and potato show to be held in the high school here December 1 and 2, according to the show committee: J. O. Staats, Don Stewart and the Rev. Harold Miles. Judges will be Professor G. P. Hyslop of Oregon State college and W. F. Cyrus, Washington county agent.

W. H. Zirney will preside over the meetings of the Clackamas county potato growers' association, whose annual meeting will be held here during the show. Speakers will include the two judges and J. J. Inskeep, Clackamas county agent. Moving pictures and slides will be shown to illustrate proper methods of growing potatoes and corn. Several special exhibits have been arranged by potato growers and 4-H clubs and Future Farmers of America will have separate exhibitions.

LUMBER SHIPMENT FROM SCIO HEAVY

SCIO, Nov. 30.—About 35 cars of lumber have been shipped from Scio by J. M. Heleo since he started up his sawmill at Scio four months ago, according to figures presented by him a few days ago.

Heleo's investment amounts to about \$5000 and the capacity of his plant is approximately 10,000 feet in 10 hours. Logs for the mill are trucked from timber areas east of Scio, and the products are shipped, for the most part, to Portland lumber brokers.

Fifteen men are employed in connection with the operations. The finished product sells for \$10 to \$12 a thousand. A large tonnage of sawdust also is disposed of, it was stated.

Heleo states he endeavors to comply with the lumbermen's code as approved by federal administration. His men work 120 hours per month, the shifts being six hours per day and five days per week.
