PORTLAND, Dec. 2. (A) - Advance of 1 cent generally in the price bid for colored fowls was somewhat out of the normal considering the season. The advance appeared chiefly due to the desire of the public to buy smaller fowls than the tom turkeys, which have been inclined to show more or less sluggishness in movement recently. The last session of the produce exchange quoted a general rise of 1 cent for colored fowls.


