## Smiths Honor Guests At Affair

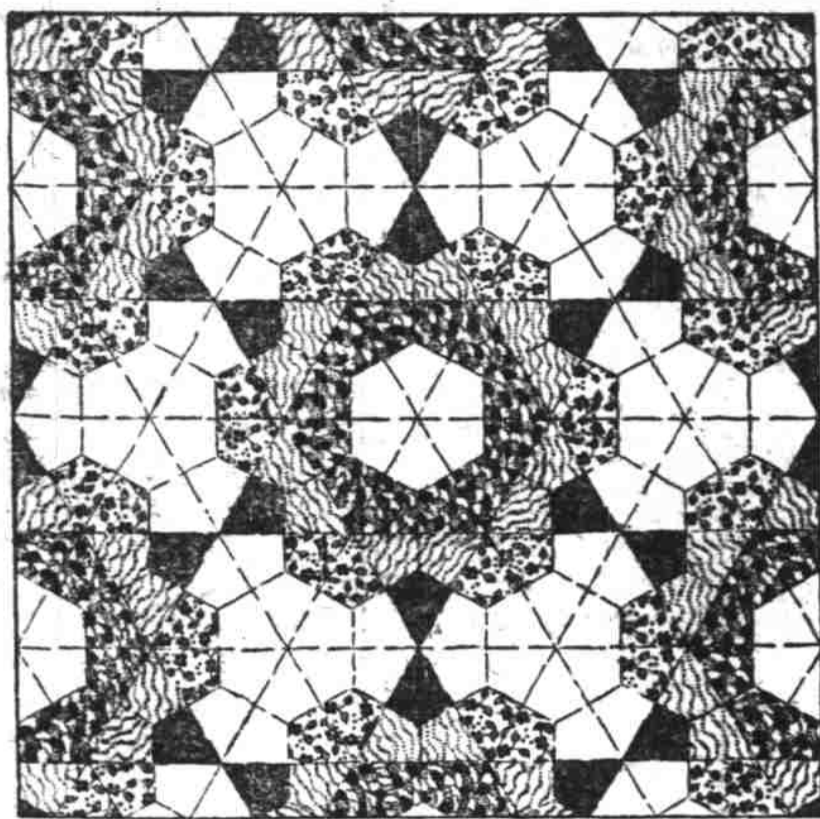

## Playing Tricks Value Shown

Today Mrs. William H. Quinn, Culbertson associate, explains boards 3 and 16, which were played in both sections at the closing night of The Oregon Statesman's bridge tournament. Her statement on the bidding follows. She deals especially with the playing trick values in each hand.

The hand:  
North: Q J 9 4, K 10 9 8 2, A 4, A 3.  
West: A 8 3 2, Q J, 9 8 6 3 2, 10 9.  
East: 10 6 5, 6 5 4, Q J, K Q 8 7 5.  
South: K 7, A 7 3, K 10 7 5, J 6 4 2.  
East and west were vulnerable. South was the dealer.  
The bidding:  
South West North East  
Pass Pass 1♥(1) Pass  
2♥(2) Pass 3♥(3) Pass  
3NT(4) Pass Pass

(1) Three honor tricks and a double honor suit.  
(2) 3½ playing tricks: ½-K 7, 1-A 7 3.

½-K 10 7 5, J 6 4 2.  
2 honor tricks plus 1 long suit trick plus ½ short suit trick equals 3½ playing tricks.  
(3) North's hand contains 5½ playing tricks:  
½-Q J 9 4, ½-K 10 9 8 2, 1-A 4, 1-A 3.  
3 honor tricks plus 2½ long suit tricks equals 5½ playing tricks (long suit tricks in hearts equal 1 each).  
(4) South completes the picture of his hand.
