

OREGON LACKS CONTROL LAWS

Utah, Pennsylvania, Ohio To Ratify Amendment, End Prohibition

fying conventions today — plans were made for going quickly through the formality of disposing of prohibition. All three voted November 7 to repeal the 18th amendment. Utah arranged a program of formalities for doing away with the thirteen year old dry law that bade fair to withhold liquor from the nation until late in the afternoon. Ohio and Pennsylvania planned prompt ratification.

In the states permitting immediate sale, the tendency was away from the old fashioned, brass-railed bar with leanings generally toward sale with food in eating places or in unbroken packages.

Washington and Oregon were two of the few states that stood without restrictive laws regarding the sale of liquor on the eve of repeal. In Washington, the legislature met in special session yesterday to formulate legislation. In Oregon, the legislature was working on a bill. Whether liquor could be sold legally in Indiana was doubtful with an advisory commission working on a report from transmission to Governor McNutt.

In Massachusetts there was a possibility of the legislature acting last night to make legal sales possible in some sections today.

Another barrier to repeal was threatened yesterday. Canon William Sheafe Chase, president of the international reform federation, who already has pending in the District of Columbia supreme court a petition seeking to prevent the acting secretary of state from proclaiming repeal, said he would bring action tomorrow in Pennsylvania to keep that state from ratifying repeal.

UTAH INSISTS UPON LAST RATIFICATION

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by Pennsylvania and Ohio before acting in order to be the thirty-sixth state to ratify.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4. (P)—Repeal of the eighteenth amendment will become effective tomorrow upon ratification of the 21st amendment by Utah.

The sale of liquor in states that permit will be legal after the Utah ratifying convention has acted upon the repealing amendment and will not await the formality of proclamation by the state department and President Roosevelt.

Plans have been made, however, to hurry to Washington the official word of the actions of Pennsylvania, Ohio and Utah. When these notifications have been received, the state department and President Roosevelt will proclaim the 18th amendment repealed.

ARGUMENT FOR PRIVATE SALES

Senate Committee Hearing Bombarded by Oratory For Change in Bill

Jack Luhn for the retail grocers, S. F. Durkheimer for the wholesalers, Elton Watkins for the grocers and independent merchants, Stephen Mathieu for the druggists, argued against the state going into the business because of the excessive cost and its experimental character, and urged that established merchants could handle the traffic under strict regulation, with greater revenue to the state.

Prohibitionists who appeared spoke in favor of the Knox plan as a substitute for prohibition, but suggested amendments Ray Gill of the state grange urged that the commission be named, one member each by each member of the board of control. He urged prohibition of liquor advertising and that precincts be given privilege of local option, and elections on the question be allowed at any regular or special election instead of solely at biennial general elections. His remarks were endorsed by B. S. Martin, Dr. B. Earle Parker, Rev. S. Darlow Johnson and Dr. E. S. Hammond of Salem, and Rev. J. R. Turnbull of Albany.

Restaurant Owners Ask Dancing Tie-In
L. C. Binford spoke for the suburban restaurant owners of Portland who wanted privilege of having small dance floors in their restaurants with permission to sell light wines and beer. Nell Quinn, for the waitress' union, urged more liberal treatment of restaurants in serving more potent liquors. John Latourette for the hotel keepers, predicted a continuance of speakeasies unless hotels were permitted to serve hard liquors to guests in their dining rooms.

Rev. Father Waters of Albany offered amendments to permit importation of sacramental wines with sufficient fortification to preserve them. J. E. Bennett of Portland offered some amendments protecting state's financial interests. C. A. Sprague of Salem offered suggestions on changing the text of the act, particularly to have the regular state bureau of credit conduct the auditing for the commission.

The senate committee following the hearing went into executive session to consider amendments. Another session will be held today, but Senator Dickson, chairman, said no more public hearings will be held. The bill is expected to be reported out Wednesday to the senate.

or the true value of the property, I can force these mortgagees to pay that price, which will give the property owner some money for his place.

"It is common knowledge that it is impossible to secure a buyer for property now. No one has money enough to take part and bid in the sales held by the sheriff. Consequently the mortgagees bid in the property for what they wish and many times take a deficiency judgment against the home owner, when the property would sell for a lot more than the debts if there were people with money to bid in at the sale."

"I am trying to discourage the creditor class from bringing mortgage foreclosure suits until we get on our feet again. If they persist in doing so they are going to pay a fair price for the property."

Shortly after the decision of Judge Lewelling, Peter Borchers filed a mortgage foreclosure suit against P. J. and Bernice Russ. According to the complaint, the Russ property was mortgaged two years ago for \$15,000, the debt
