QUOTATIONS ON EGGS ARE UNDERCUT CENT

PORTLAND, Dec. 5. (AP)—While there was no open change in egg quotations for the day, general prices suggested a loss of about 1c from printed figures. Receipts of extras were increasing.

There was a near famine of live chicken offerings here but prices generally were unchanged for the day. Turkeys were so cheap that the trade was not inclined to bid up for chickens which were expected to show increased volume with the next day or so.

Market for country killed meats was showing a softer tone with some downward price revisions for the day in veal and in hogs while lamb continued in firm request at full prices at least.

All interests agree that current demand for potatoes is at extreme low ebb in this and most leading markets of the country. Prices were nominally unchanged at the source.

Market for onions was holding firm at \$1 net to the grower at primary prices. Local jobbing price on Oregon has advanced nominally to \$1.35 with Yakima stock uneven with very poor quality.

Stocks Firm All Day Closes With Lively Rallies

NEW YORK, Dec. 5. (AP)—Most markets took a turn for the better today. Stocks, firm all day, closed with a lively rally that boosted prices 5 to 1 points and lifted the turnover to 2,041,297 shares.

Steel stocks responded to the higher operating ratio. U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, National, Youngstown and Republic advanced a point or two. Automobile issues traded briskly, the day's largest single transaction being a 25,000 share block of General Motors which changed hands toward closing time. That stock gained about a point net, while Chrysler gained 2 and Nash one. American Radiator figured in a good turnover at higher prices; Johns-Manville was up more than 4 to a new 1933 high. Allied Chemical's gain was 5. U. S. Smelters nearly as much, and Du Pont's slightly better than 3. Santa Fe Preferred jumped 5 1/2 net, the common 2.
