Prominent among that school of modern authors who have found their places in American letters after reaching middle age and who depend for themes upon the everyday lives of everyday individuals they have known is Bess Streeter Aldrich. As the widow of a Nebraska country banker, Mrs. Aldrich started putting herself and her friends down on paper and did it so successfully that almost before she realized it one of her books was among the "best-sellers."

In "Lantern in Her Hand" she achieved that strange combination of modern style and appealing character story which brought her recognition from many camps of thought. Those who read "Lantern in Her Hand" and its sequel, "White Bird Flying," have awaited with interest her latest book, "Miss Bishop," the story of a mid-western college teacher, received only last week at the Salem public library. They will not be disappointed. Although in style it more nearly follows the trend of "Mother Mason" than either of the other two novels, "Miss Bishop" has for its central figure a strong personality in whom many readers will recognize persons of their own acquaintance, a woman whose seemingly drab and uninteresting life is filled with problems the world does not see and whose solution of those problems makes her a fascinating study.

\$500 Reward Paid

Stephens and L. L. Dalze of Redwood City, who found the body in lower San Francisco bay while duck hunting. The finding of the body preceded only a few hours the lynching of Thomas H. Thurmond and John M. Holmes, who confessed the kidnaping and slaying.

DALLAS WILL AWAIT
STATE LIQUOR LAW

DALLAS, Dec. 6.—Members of the Dallas city council held their regular meeting at the city hall Monday night and decided to wait until the state legislature passed a liquor law before enacting any city ordinance regarding the sale of liquor. The only regulation in effect now is the ordinance concerning the sale of beer and wines of 3.2 alcoholic content.

The ordinance permitting the playing of card games in places other than pool rooms passed its second reading at this meeting. The old ordinance had stated that card games could only be played in pool halls.

Mayor Finseth reported that he had taken the matter of the in-

surance rates here up with the board in Portland and that the group agreed to send an examiner here in the near future to see whether the rates could be lowered. The survey being used at the present time for determining insurance rates was made in 1926 and the city pointed out that since that time the fire fighting equipment has been improved and several fire hazards have been removed.
