TAXATION ON BEER AND WINE FAVORED

A statewide tax on beer, wines, port and other malt beverages was voted Thursday afternoon by the house, the measure carrying without dissenting vote. Sponsors of the enactment, HB 106, were Representatives Beckman and Johnson, both of whom served on the house committee on alcoholic control.

Beer is to be taxed at the rate of \$1 for each 31-gallon barrel. Other beverages enumerated by the act will be taxed 25 cents a gallon.

The tax is to be paid monthly

to the state treasurer and by him disbursed, after expenses of collection are paid, 75 per cent to the counties and 25 per cent to the state.

Being a tax law, the measure does not contain the emergency clause.

Raymond B. Wilcox, state relief head, urged in a letter to Governor Meier Thursday that these revenues be set aside for state relief until the \$3,000,000 liquor fund advance for relief is paid. Under HB 106 as passed, none of these moneys will go to relief.

Estimates on the moneys to be raised under this bill range from \$750,000 to \$1,500,000 annually.
