Chickens See Floods Atop Riding Roost

RICKREALL, Dec. 7.—One of the worst rain and wind storms for years swept Rickreall Tuesday afternoon and night, bringing the creek up to the highest stage that

it has been since 1896. All low land on both sides of the stream was flooded with a swift current running through the gardens. Several inches of water flooded the Black Bird Inn basement and all the tables belonging to the Fuller camp grounds were carried away. Even the chickenhouse belonging to Hanna was flooded, with the fowls roosting in the windows.

From the Bayard Findley place Carroll place about a mile east the water covered the highway

in some places a foot and a half, making travel slow on account of turns in the road. Going was dangerous to persons not familiar with the highway.

The school bus made the north trip and in spite of deep water had the pupils to school only 10 minutes late.

ZENA, Dec. 7.—Small streams overflowed their banks, ditches along the roadside were running full and in some places flowing into the main road and fields were

covered with water in the valley after the heavy deluge of rain and wind this week, beginning Tuesday.

WEST SALEM, Dec. 7.—It has seemed quite interesting to have the main line trains routed through here this week, due to high water and washouts on the main line.

LIBERTY, Dec. 7.—This community had rather a drowned appearance Wednesday after Tuesday's big rain and wind storm.

Yards and roads were awash, dry ditches turned to turbulent roaring streams and many telephone lines were out of order.

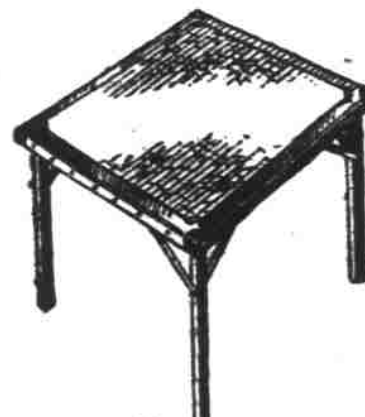
