NEW YORK, Dec. 12. (AP)—Stocks developed a downward list today, although defections from the recently firmer trend amounted to only a small fractional net loss for the averages. Volume contracted to 1,657,282 shares, or about 800,000 under Monday's turnover.

Stocks seemed to lack decisive leadership. Rails were less aggressive than recently.

Rail equipments benefited by reports of prospective increases in the companies' business, particularly larger inquiries for freight cars and expectations that locomotive orders, virtually nonexistent for two years, were in the making.

American Car & Foundry preferred rose nearly 6 points, Baldwin preferred one and American Locomotive preferred more than 3.

LABISH CENTER, Dec. 12. — Although press reports indicate that the Oregon onion has brought as much as \$1.15 a hundred within the past few days, that price has not been offered here. It is thought that that price may have been offered at the Sherwood district.

Sales were still being made here Monday at \$1 a hundred, although late in the day there were rumors of a 10-cent raise.

Quality of the local product has been quite irregular, due to poor weather conditions when the onions were placed in storage and immediately following.

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1933 WORLD WOOL CLIP TO DECREASE

The 1933 world wool clip will be smaller than that of last year, and less than the average for the five preceding years, according to the bureau of agricultural economics in its current report on world wool prospects.

The bureau estimates that production in 19 countries which produce more than four-fifths of the world clip, exclusive of Russia and China, will be about 2,541,000,000 pounds, a reduction of 5 per cent from the 1932 clip, and of 5 per cent from the 1928-32 five-year average.

Five-year wool markets have been characterized by rising prices and sustained activity during the past month, and statistics on trade and manufacturing activity for the year to date show a decided improvement over corresponding figures for last year, it is stated.

Consumption of combed and clothing wool in the United States by manufacturers reporting in September was about 16 per cent below the July peak, and further slackening in mill activity in October and November is indicated. Consumption in the first nine months of this year, however, was 40 per cent larger than in the same period last year.

Butterfat Off 2 Cents Here

Butterfat dropped two cents on the Salem market yesterday, to top of 19 cents, while prints and cubes took a cent backward slide.

Butterfat was generally off 1c lb. for the day.

Other markets were unchanged, though cattle are slightly stronger.

PORTLAND, Dec. 12. (AP)—General reduction in the price on cube butter during the late session of the exchange was not unexpected.

Light supply of chickens continued to arrive here today but operators were still unwilling to advance bids. There was a better feeling in the east which may stimulate midwest poultry in California.

Still another reorganization of the produce exchange has been accomplished here. An effort was being made to wrest the making of egg prices away from the Co-ops.

General steady trading was continued in the market for country killed hogs and veal here with lamb firm but unchanged as yet in price. Beef remained in an over-load as has been indicated for months past.

Price slacking was showing in the market for nuts with the exception of walnuts. The reported practice of an Oregon organization placing California nuts in its sacks, was being condemned by the trade generally.

Potato prices were being almost openly shaded.

Onion prices were firmer to higher here and in the valley.

Apple trade was more active locally.
