By LOUISE BENNETT WEAVER TWO CHRISTMAS PUDDINGS (With Their Sauces) Some families prefer to have fruit puddings for dessert for Christmas dinner. Here are given you two recipes. One is richer than the other, so you can take your choice. The puddings can be made now and stored in a cool place until serving time when they can be reheated for 30 minutes in a double boiler.

English Plum Pudding (Using Suet) 1 1/2 cups flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg 1/2 teaspoon cloves 1 cup sugar 1 cup chopped raisins 1/2 cup chopped currants 1/2 cup chopped candied orange peel 1/2 cup chopped citron 1/2 cup chopped candied cherries 1 cup bread crumbs 3 eggs, beaten 1 teaspoon soda 1 cup chopped beef suet 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1 cup milk Mix ingredients and pour into two-pound molds, filling half full. Steam 3 1/2 hours. Serve warm.

Foamy Sauce 1/2 cup butter 3 cups confectioner's sugar 1/2 cup cream 2 teaspoons vanilla 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract 1/2 teaspoon salt 3 eggs, beaten Cream butter and sugar. Add cream and heat in double boiler until the mixture becomes very creamy. Stir constantly. Add rest of ingredients, mix well and serve warm. If desired a tablespoon of rum flavoring can be added to sauce.

Steamed Carrot Pudding (Delicious and inexpensive.) 1 cup grated raw potatoes 1 cup grated raw carrots 1 cup flour 1 cup raisins 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon cloves 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon soda Mix ingredients and half fill greased pudding mold. Cover tightly and steam 3 hours. Serve warm, cut in slices. The pudding can be made days prior to serving and be reheated for 30 minutes in double boiler.
