Game License Business Increased

Materially at the courthouse this year over 1932, according to U. G. Boyer, county clerk. Total receipts this year were \$1491 comparing \$1045 in 1932.

This year 190 hunter's licenses were sold at \$3 each compared to 130 a year ago. Fishing licenses at \$3 each totalled 174 this year to only 94 in 1932. Mr. Boyer yesterday remitted \$137 to the state game commission in final payment for this year's licenses.

Appearance of the new chronum and black automobile license plates are becoming more numerous the secretary of state announced Wednesday. To date 25,488 pairs of the 1934 licenses have been sold by the department of state, an increase of 8,000 over the corresponding date at mid-year for the six-months licenses. Plates this month, sold at a flat license fee of \$5 will be good until January 1, 1935.

SALEM GUARD UNITS QUOTAS ARE FILLED

Salem's national guard units are having no difficulty in keeping up to their full enlistment quotas, the local commandants, Captain Arthur B. Bates of Headquarters battery, 249th Coast artillery, and Captain H. G. Malsion, Company B, 162nd Infantry, declare. Both units have waiting lists.

"Of course there are changes all the time but there are always men ready to enlist," Captain Malsion commented. Company B is now training for the annual inspection by army officers to take place early in 1934. At full strength, it has 60 men and three officers.

"We were short one man for some time but held off on enlistment to get some older men," Captain Bates stated. "The older men are needed because our work is largely technical. We have a number of applications on file."
