The Salem Brewery Association's Reply to

The Salem Trades and Labor Council's Statement

Appearing in the Salem Press

The Salem Brewery Association recognizes and will continue to recognize and carefully consider any grievances of its employees in the matter of wages and working conditions. There will be no discrimination against any employee, regardless of whether he belongs to a union or not, and this good old fashioned doctrine will be followed.

Our brewery is operating under the N.R.A. Code and Industrial Act. It is paying MORE than the minimum scale of wages required under the Code. There is no provision in the Code which compels any manufacturing concern to recognize any union. We are and will continue to conduct our business on the AMERICAN PLAN, which plan has the support of the President of the United States and every fair minded citizen.

The Salem Trades and Labor Council has placed our brewery on the unfair list, which is equivalent to a boycott. This is not alone a violation of the Code, but an outright attempt to destroy an institution which has invested hundreds of thousands of dollars in the community. Our brewery is located in the heart of a valley which produces the finest hops and brewing barley in the whole world. Shall this industry, with its payroll and financial assistance to growers through crop purchases, be destroyed simply because it refuses to be dominated and coerced by unfair agitators?

We repeat that we are not unfair to labor; we repeat that we are paying more in wages than the Industrial Code provides; we repeat that any employee with a grievance shall have a fair hearing and we strenuously deny that the manner in which we conduct our own business can in any way result in any breakdown of the Industrial Recovery Act.

We reserve to ourselves the right of every good American citizen to conduct his own affairs in any manner he feels justified, so long as he does not injure his neighbor and is honest and fair with his employee. Can anything be more fair and just?

We will allow the entire matter to rest in the good judgment and common sense of the people of Salem and surrounding country. Let them be the jury.
