ALBERT E. RANDALL

SCIO, Dec. 28 .- Funeral services for Albert E. Randall, 74, native Scioan, were held at the Baptist church here Wednesday afternoon and interment was in Franklin Butte cemetery. The church services were in charge of a Methodist minister, and L. L. Swan of Albany handled the Masonic features of the funeral.

Among early-day Scio friends of the deceased who officiated as active pallbearers were Wint Young and George DeVaney of this locality and Lee Bilyeu, Lebanon. Honorary pallbearers included W. A. Ewing and Riley Shelton of Scio and T. J. Munkers of Portland, pioneer of the Scio region and an old-time friend of the deceased.

The Scio Masonic lodge participated in the ritualistic rites at the church. Albert E. Randall died at his home in Albany December 23 following an illness of several weeks caused by a paralytic

Mr. Randall's parents were among the early pioneers of the Scio region, having located near this city in 1847. He was born on the old donation land claim one mile south of Scio on December 7, 1859, and was the last of a family of nine children.

Most of the active life of Mr. Randall was spent in Linn county, where he was engaged in farming. 
