WASHINGTON, Dec. 29. (AP)-Wheat payments totaling \$17, 578,053 made to 232,759 farmers were announced today by the farm administration under the cash benefit plan of acreage reduction.

Approximately 500,000 wheat farmers signed applications for contracts under which they will reduce their acreage next year in 1450 counties and payment has been approved for 1315 of these

To date the administration already has received 389,044 of performers in Miss Barnes' revue the contracts and the farmers unnorthwest.

Under the contracts wheat farmers agree to cut their acreage in 1934 by 15 per cent from their average production for the preceding three, four, or five Kansas lead all other states in


