FANCY VEAL IS PRICED HIGHER

Butterfat took a one-cent boost locally Friday for a new top of 17 cents. Prints and cubes are quoted at 21 and 23 cents, respectively.

A 50 cent per hundred increase in price of top fancy veal is also quoted. Other commodities held even.

PORTLAND, Dec. 29. (P)—Receipts and churn of butter locally continued to show a small volume, this being reflected in further strength in the price situation together with advances forced on the local exchange.

On the exchange the late session showed 1/2 to 1c rise with extras moving to the higher figures. The price here was not above that ruling previous to the big break.

Butterfat was advanced 1c as a result of the higher price on extra butter.

Trading in the egg market was somewhat better character with most of the storage stuff out of the way and the public showing its appreciation by purchasing more heavily.

Advance of 1c pound in the cheese price on the local exchange, suggested some improvement in the undertone generally. Tillamook continued to quote former high figures.

There continued a good call for country killed meats. Onion trade was drifting at Willamette valley sources. Growers were not inclined to offer below \$1.50 and \$1.35 offers of buyers were not keen. Suggestion is that business will start after the year's turn.

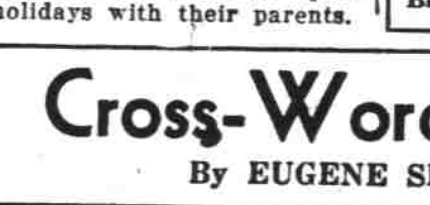

Cross-Word Puzzle

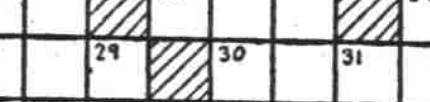
