COAST HOP MART SEASONABLY DULL

Principally reflecting the usual seasonal dullness, Pacific coast hop markets remained very quiet during the week ending January 4, according to the Weekly Hop Market Review of the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

While exact figures are lacking for some districts as yet, available trade estimates indicate that December 1, 1933, only about 59,000 bales of the 1933 crop, estimated at around 182,000 bales, remained unsold in growers' hands in Oregon, Washington and California.

For Oregon hops, prices remained nominally unchanged, ranging from 25c to 35c per pound, net to grower, for 1933 crop hops, with price variation depending upon quality and to some extent the district where grown.

While here and there prices were being shaded by sellers of eggs, the general market was unchanged with an active consuming demand in sight.

Firm demand was shown for chickens throughout the trade despite recent attempts of the produce exchange to force lower prices in spots.

Demand for turkeys was holding up well locally with a good carload call from the east for storage purposes.

There was continued talk of higher prices being demanded for potatoes by Yakima but the trade here and at Seattle continued to name former resale figures.

SOME WOOL BEING HELD FOR ADVANCE

BOSTON, Jan. 5. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin of Boston will say tomorrow: "The wool market has continued quiet during the past week and prices have shown no quotable change, although some holders are disposed to ask more money on account of the stronger tone in the foreign markets."

CHICAGO, Jan. 5. (AP)—Setbacks in grain prices formed the rule today as a result of moderate selling in a market devoid of any aggressive support from buyers.

The late downturns of grain values contrasted with an earlier upward trend, and were more or less associated with Washington reports of proposed congressional efforts to eliminate voluntary features of the agricultural adjustment act and to compel farm minorities to comply with production control programs.

Wheat closed unsettled near the day's low point and 1/4% under yesterday's finish, corn 1/2 cent down, oats unchanged to 1/4 cent lower, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 7 cents.
