Permit Refused—The Continental Insurance Company with headquarters in St. Louis has been notified to cease doing business in Oregon. A. H. Averill, state insurance commissioner, announced Saturday. Averill declared that the financial status of the company was not satisfactory and did not meet the requirements of his office. The Oregon depositors will receive all protection that is possible. Averill said. The 1933 report showed that the company has 1113 policy holders with \$2,627,999 insurance in Oregon. The company's investments in Oregon aggregate \$60,000 with mortgage loans of \$124,000.

FAVORITISM DENIED IN SALARY CUTTING

Charles M. Thomas, state utility commissioner, Saturday denied emphatically that he had intended to show any preference to officials of the Portland General Electric company in his recent order deferring action on the salaries of these officials until a hearing had been held.

The charge had been made that Thomas had arbitrarily reduced the salaries of officials of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, the Northwestern Electric company group and other utilities but had granted a hearing to the officials of the Portland General Electric company before taking any action.

Thomas declared that a number of elements entered into the salary adjustments of officials of the Portland General Electric company which were not involved in the budget of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company. He said that his preliminary investigations showed that the officials of the Portland General Electric company were receiving smaller salaries than those of the telephone company, that there were fewer employees, and that the financial affairs of the concern apparently were being conducted on a sound financial basis. He also declared that the Portland General Electric company had a holding company charge such as those contained in the budgets of the telephone company and the Northwestern electric group.

FACULTY FORUM AT WILLAMETTE HELPS

Willamette university faculty members are finding an innovation in university administration this year most helpful. The new plan is a "faculty forum" which supplants old-style faculty meetings.

The purpose of the forum is a study of educational problems pertaining to the entire faculty; the general topic for the first portion of the 1933-1934 school year has been the adjustment of work to student ability.

The forum meets monthly and discusses preassigned topics for which a study outline has been prepared. In October the faculty discussed "The Freshmen Seen Through Grades and Test Scores." In November the subject under discussion was "How Should Upper Division Procedure Differ from That of the Lower Division?"

Last month the faculty discussed "Non-Academic Factors in a College Education."

Dean Frank M. Erickson presides at the meetings.
