EGG MARKET ACTIVE AT LOWER PRICES

Butter Looks Higher, Spots;
Lambs Advance to 13c;
Onions Still Move

PORTLAND, Jan. 8. (AP)—Trading
in the egg market was more
active and generally at lower
prices. While local co-ops were
reported holding for 21c dozen for
extras, all others indicated a 20c
top for that grade.

In spots the market for butter
looked higher here as a result
of greatly increased consuming
movement of late. Total production,
while not holding up so well,
indicating the fulfillment of trying
to establish proper quotations on
the Portland produce exchange
based upon supply and demand is
reflected in the weekly review of
the cheese trade. The late decline
in price on the local exchange
was utterly out of line with what
was happening in practically all
other parts of the country, the
survey shows.

Instead of lower prices, as
named on the local exchange,
higher prices were generally
forced elsewhere with the government
purchases creating the boost.

Demand for live chickens was
still of firm character with here
and there talk of a premium of
at least 1/4c in the buying price.
Entire poultry market suggested
a like condition.

Country killed lambs advanced
to 13c pound, a new high for top
quality here for the late movement.
There was also a firmer
tone for calves with hogs about
steady.

Advices from both Yakima and
the Deschutes suggested tighter
holding for higher potato prices
which affected the local situation
although as yet no betterment in
resale prices were showing here.

Willamette valley primary
points continued to show a heavy
movement of onions to the east
and prices were being held firm
to a higher as a result. Local trade
was still unchanged.

Greasy Combing Wool is Firmly Quoted, Boston

BOSTON, Jan. 8. (AP)—(U. S.
Dept. Agr.)—Greasy combing
domestic wool was firmly quoted on
the Boston market even though
sales had been relatively light.
Since the latter part of November
wool men continued to show a
very confident attitude toward
prices. Sentiment was helped
greatly by the recent price advances
in foreign wool markets and by
inquiries from domestic manufacturers.

Estimated receipts of domestic
wool at Boston, reported by the
Boston grain and flour exchange
during week ending Jan. 6,
amounted to 129,000 pounds compared
with 4,823,700 during the
previous week.
