EGG MART ACTIVE GRANGERS' AT LOWER PRICES

Butter Looks Higher, Spots: Lambs Advance to 13c: Onions Still Move

PORTLAND, Jan. 8. (A)-Trading in the egg market was more active and generally at lower prices. While local co-ops were reported holding for 21c dozen for extras, all others indicated a 20c top for that grade.

In spots the market for butter looked higher here as a result of greatly increased consuming movement of late. Total production, while more than seasonable, was not holding up so well.

Indicating the futility of trying to establish proper quotations on the Portland produce exchange based upon supply and demand is reflected in the weekly review of the cheese trade. The late decline in price on the local exchange was utterly out of line with what was happening in practically all other parts of the country, the Instead of lower prices, as

named on the local exchange, igher prices were generally forced elsewhere with the government purchases creating the boost. Demand for live chickens was

still of firm character with here and there talk of a premium of at least %c in the buying price. Entire poultry market suggested a like condition. Country killed lambs advanced


