The girl's silk embroidered slippers were about six inches long, while those of her grandmother's showed how tightly her feet were bound in a three inch shoe.

Native Chinese music dates back as far as 2600 B. C. It is not the loud, blatant noise we hear in seaport towns, where the musicians are trying to copy the music of the foreigners in their midst, but the musical calls of the native peddlers and coolies in the interior, typify the importance of music in the Chinese life.

Music is an important element in the life of the Chinese. If a new shop is opened, an orchestra will be engaged. Wedding processions, dressed in red, play music to typify their moods and emotions.


