## Salem High Conquers Jitters, Beats Rooks in Overtime

### 11 Points on Free Tosses Important Factor in **Tight Contest**

It was a torrid, exciting game that Salem high school's basketball team won, 25 to 23 in an overtime period, from the Oregon State college Rooks Thursday night on the Salem high floor. but in winning the red and black found the jitters a more formidable foe than the tall but awkward Rooks.

Behind nearly all the way, Salem high stayed in the race by virtue of exceptional shooting from the free throw line, sinking

Trailing 4-3 the first quarter, third quarter post was passed. A report of survey made by the colleges was read at the annual meeting of the group by Daniel Marsh, president of Boston university. It was prepared by Thomas S. Gates, president of the University of Pennsylvania, head of a committee on college athlet-

Referring to a report on college athletics, made in 1928, by the Carnegie foundation, Mr. Gates asserted that "from this report may be dated the housecleaning on a large scale that occurred in a good many colleges, Barclay ments of physical education and athletics."

Facts and figures for the 1933 trend were compiled from more than 200 explanations made by presidents, deans and directors of colleges and universities.
