Parked Car Hit — Charles A. Bort, 435 Market street, reported to city police yesterday that his automobile had struck a car parked on the wrong side of the street at the intersection of Fourth and Norway streets. He said rain and darkness prevented his seeing the machine in time to avoid the accident. He did not know who owned the parked machine. Grimm, route one at Court and Commercial; E. E. Hamilton, 164 Marion, and an unidentified motorist, at Winter and Marion.

Hendricks, editor emeritus of The Statesman, is to make a short talk, recounting incidents from the early days of the paper, at the newspapermen's banquet tonight at Eugene. Mrs. Hendricks will accompany him on the trip and the two will visit relatives in the Lane county city. A number of other newspapermen from Salem plan to attend the conference which began last night and continues until Saturday noon. The Eugene chamber of commerce is host at tonight's banquet, an annual affair.

Bakery Answers — An answer to a damage suit recently filed against the Salem Bakery company and others here last week, was filed Thursday in circuit court by the bakery. It asserts that George W. Rice, plaintiff, was negligent and that he did not exercise ordinary caution. The suit involves an auto accident last August in which Rice, a pedestrian, was allegedly severely injured by a bakery wagon on Court street.

Program at Roberts — The Salem Gideons will give a program at the Roberts church, south of town on the river road, tonight, starting at 7:30 o'clock. Musical numbers, pictures and other features will make up the entertainment, which is open to all without charge.

Files Answer — C. Thomas Giffen and others, defendants in two suits recently brought against them for damages growing out of the death of Charles W. Lake, Jefferson youth, October 6, 1933, filed their answers in circuit court Thursday. The truck which struck the lad, defendants say, was going through a heavy fog which made it impossible to see the boy on his bicycle from any distance. Defendants deny lack of ordinary care. William E. Lake is suing and so also is Alvira Lake, administratrix of the estate of the lad who died from the injuries received.

Trucks Not Exempted — CWA workers or men employed by the federal government and driving their own trucks are not exempt from paying the fees and licenses for such trucks, an opinion by the attorney general held Thursday. The only ones exempt from paying the licenses under the bus and truck bill are those driving vehicles owned and operated by the federal government, state or other political subdivisions. The opinion was requested by the public utilities commissioner.

Plaintiff says his left foot was severed by the shock and claims permanent disability.

Elizabeth Rivett, wedded November 20, 1928, to Samuel James Rivett, now in the navy, declares her husband refused to provide for her, was frequently intoxicated and embarrassed her before others. She asks for \$35 a month for support money, claiming her husband makes \$100 a month. Plaintiff also asks for the restoration of her maiden name of Elizabeth Schultz.

HEAVY PAYMENT OF 1934 TAX FORECAST

Heavy payments of 1934 taxes are anticipated throughout the state by March 15 this year by Charles V. Galloway, chairman of the state tax commission. Galloway pins his faith on the rebates for advance payments set by the 1933 legislature. These rebates will run from 1 to 3 per cent of the total year's tax payment.

If payers elect to return only the first quarter, which will be due in March, there will be no penalty. If they choose to pay for the first two quarters, a 1 per cent rebate on the entire amount paid will be allowed. On three quarters payment a 2 per cent rebate on the entire sum will be given while if the entire year's taxes are paid in March, a 3 per cent rebate will be given.
